Breaking the Silence

The New Zealand Herald is running an interesting series called Breaking the Silence, which is based around youth suicide and more recently self-harming. Earlier this year we were approached by the Herald to contribute to this series. We declined this offer as we were unsure of what exactly this series would contain and how they were going to portray any information we may have given them. As you may have read in some of the articles the current Ministry guidelines state that we, as teachers, should not speak about this topic. Students can bring the topic up, and if this comes up in our teaching resources such as books we can then discuss it. As a staff last year many of us trained in a course called Mental Health 101. This covered the subject of youth suicide and how to deal with young people who tell us they want to kill themselves or die. Yes, it happens at our school, and when the students have disclosed this information to us we have been able to use these tools and have found them useful.

In Class 9 Health recently we have been looking at support networks and who the students can go to for help in different scenarios. Sometimes that help can come from friends but due to life experience often it is better to get support from older people. As part of the Mates and Dates program, Class 8, 9, 10 and 11 have been participating in, students have also discussed where they can go to for help.

At school the students select a Mentor who they can go to at any time for extra support; they also have their sponsor teacher they can speak to. Maxine, our Counsellor, and Sandy, our School Nurse are also available. If you have concerns about your child please speak to their sponsor first and they will be able to help.

I encourage parents in the High School to talk to their children about this series and to highlight to their children where they can get help from. They might talk to you, but you could also point out that they can talk to others, such as aunties or uncles, grandparents, and their friend's parents. It might be worthwhile to talk to parents of your child's friends and just check in if you have worries, so you feel you are supported. I would like to think that my child's friend's parents were able to support my child if they came to them for help or to answer a question they might have. It does indeed take a community to raise and support a child.

Dear School Community

Thank you for giving our production of Joseph so much support both in the making and the attendance and appreciation. I just wanted to add a note on ticket prices as there were a number of people asking why the tickets were so expensive.

Every play that is still in copyright requires a license. Copyright usually lasts 70 years after the death of the Author, so any 20th or 21st Century play requires a license. Older plays can also require a license if they are newly translated or edited. Play licenses usually cost between \$200 and \$400 per performance and many of the plays we perform at Taikura require a licence.

Musicals are in another class of cost. The performing license usually costs \$2,000, to \$3,000 for three performances. Added to that are the cost of an orchestra, sound system, costumes, set etc When we produced "Oliver!" our last whole school musical about 9 years ago the actually cost of production was \$6,000 which was almost exactly what we took at the door. The cafe turned this into a profit.

For Joseph we knew we needed an average ticket price of about \$10:00 or \$11:00 if we more or less filled each audience, and we wanted to keep the numbers simple so that is how we came to \$15:00 for adults and \$5:00 for students.

I had no intention of making a profit on the production but of being as sure as I could be that I wasn't going to make a loss because we would have had to find the money from somewhere. This is an attempt to explain why we charge tickets at all and why we decide on a particular ticket price.




