



## Spring Reflections

Spring's first flush is upon us. There is a stretch in the evening, a shift in the quality of the light as the earth begins once more to turn its face to the sun. We see it in the blossoms and blooming bulbs, in the newborn animals in the paddocks. We hear it in the symphony of song as birds busy themselves building their nests. Against a backdrop of verdant green muslin or silk, these are the components of the spring seasonal table – a branch in blossom, felt or knitted lambs and chicks, a woven nest filled with felted or crystal eggs.

In times past, when we relied more wholly on the land for sustenance, these were known as the lean months, when stores of roots and squash run low, autumn fruits that do remain have lost all memory of summer, and winter citrus wanes. New planted seedlings begin to sprout and grow, but need time to mature to the point of consumption. Young plants are vulnerable to a sudden frost, a deluge, the unwanted attentions of a hungry bird or animal. We must plant out more than we need so that enough will survive to maturity, to feed us and to spawn seeds or tubers to continue the cycle of life.

As the land awakens, so too do we experience a spiritual awakening. The thoughts and feelings we have been germinating in the darkness of winter ignite a hunger in us for action, for connection. Spring is the season for doing, for exercising our will and our creativity. For many this looks like getting our hands in the soil, to plot and plant and propagate. But there are many ways to feed our desire for creation – collaborative crafts projects, experiences of arts and culture, music and dance. After the quiet contemplation of winter, community connections must be forged and strengthened anew.

Transitions offer their own challenges. It can be daunting to step once more into the light, to embark on a new endeavour that may fail in its infancy. But after a rain, with a little warmth and sunshine, growth is a given. Why not channel nature's gifts into conscious acts of creation and recreation which will foster the kind of community that allows us, and our tamariki, to thrive and flourish.

## Class 9 PvK Duke Of Edinburgh Canopy Tour

On Monday 13 August we left school in two vans driving in convoy, with all nineteen of our bikes on the trailers. There was lots of singing and music lead by Drew's speaker "Kevin"! We were all excited for camp to start.

We arrived at Rotorua Holiday Park which would be our sanctuary for the next five days and then travelled to Canopy Tours Zipline, which would be our first activity for the week. We were split into two groups of boys and girls. The girls went first, with help from Cheyenne and Luke our guides, we harnessed up ready to go. The boys could hear us screaming from up high in the tops of the trees. It was such an exhilarating experience from tree to tree in native New Zealand bush at fifty metres above the ground.

On day two of camp we did our first day of biking. This was a real wake up call for some of us who hadn't done enough training for the camp. Having checked our gear, we set off at 9 o'clock. Six of us doing the Duke of Edinburgh led the group. We went down a flat, paved bike path for 9km, and just as it started to rain we split into two groups. Some people went back, but seven wanted to continue to do more challenging tracks. We got to our first beautiful mountain biking track, by now it was raining quite a lot, so we used the trees for shelter even though there was rain dripping from the leaves above our heads, as we biked along the mossy track. This track was scary for me and it was then when I realized I had not done enough biking practice. I was not very confident on my bike, and there were many challenges for me such as, biking nonstop uphill for half a kilometre, overcoming my feeling of being scared on my bike and getting much more confident on my bike. These were also the biggest achievements. We continued biking up hills, over roots, speeding down the bumpy tracks at full speed and jumping over stones so as to not pop the tires. We stopped at a beautiful blue lake for lunch and enjoyed the stunning views on the track. When Gee said we were nearly back at the place we started, I thought she meant where we started the mountain biking, I was expecting to have to bike another 9 kms. Not realizing we were at the start of the bike track and almost back at camp until we got out of the gorgeous forest of tall trees, we were only about 10 minutes away from camp. After biking 43 km which took us 5 and ¼ hours, I was so tired, drenched in mud and rain, I just hopped in the shower with all my clothes and shoes on, then I slipped into the hot pools for a soak.

On Wednesday morning I put on my wet biking clothes and with our sore butts we left to go on our second day of biking which was a more relaxed trip. I loved the tracks in the morning, with the beautiful ferns and tall slender trees with sunlight streaming through. We went down the XXX track that Gee had recommended **not** to do, which now I understand why. All the up hills were so challenging but when we reached the top it was worth the pain on the way down. The afternoon was an opportunity to do any tracks we wanted to do. Back at camp we jumped into the pools and relaxed.

Thursday was our day full of fun activities, the OGO was the first one, we dived into a big inflatable ball with warm water which kept us warm as it rolled around with us scrambling inside, accidentally kicking each other in the face, smashing into the side of the ball and falling on the go pro. When Gee and Morag went down, we lay down on the track so their ball could run over us on it's way down. After that we went to Skyline Rotorua for the luge. It was my first time zooming down the track on a small go-cart, getting air on some of the jumps was scary and to top it all off, getting rammed into the side of the track by Gee on our last run down. In the afternoon we went for a stroll around the gorgeous blue lake on the outskirts of Rotorua for a couple of hours.

Friday was our last day of camp. We tidied up our cabins. Loaded all the bikes and set off back to school, it was a car ride of laughing, singing and games. Back at school we unloaded the vans and trailers, then camp was over.





