Turning Over A New Leaf

As you are hopefully more than aware, the way we, as a society, manage our rubbish and our recycling has become unsustainable. There are countless videos of our oceans filled with plastic, of landfills overflowing with waste and stories of recycling being shipped off to who knows where. New Zealand's 100% Pure reputation has taken a severe battering, but slowly steps are being taken to attempt to address the issues that are causing so much harm to the environment: Some supermarkets are no longer supplying plastic bags, people are buying their coffees in reusable cups, and at Countdown you can now recycle soft plastic. This is all a start.

Richly woven through the Steiner curriculum is a deep love and reverence for Mother Nature, alongside this is the notion of lifelong kaitiakitanga (guardianship) of the environment. It is therefore essential that Taikura children become aware of the impacts of their decisions and take responsibility in caring for their kura and their local environment. We take this very seriously and think it's high time for some positive change to take place within our own kura in the hope that this will sow the seed for change within the greater community.

There's a big shake up happening in the way Taikura deals with its waste and recycling and it is being led by our own tamariki. Apple cores were sneaking their way into recycling bins, yoghurt pots hiding in rubbish bins and paper floating amongst the rubbish. The Lower School is in need of a serious environmental re-education and the Rainbow Warriors have taken up the challenge. The Lower School is striving to make sure that "rubbish" is disposed of correctly and doing their utmost to learn to be sustainable Kiwis. The Rainbow Warriors are making sure that recycling, rubbish and compost end up in the right place and are trying to educate their classmates at the same time. The Rainbow Warriors and the Lower School are the beginning of a school-wide initiative to ultimately become a zero-waste school.

To this end, we are asking parents to consider what goes into lunch boxes and to look at ways to reduce the amount of potential rubbish that goes into them. We will be asking children to take any rubbish they bring to school, home with them. This will hopefully make the children much more aware of how they contribute to landfill and see how much of an impact a Zero-Waste Lunchbox can have over a year.

Main Contact Person: Kelly Sutton

Mission Statement:

A parental role, taken on for one year, which offers vital support to the community and the teaching staff. Teachers experience the capacity of parents over the years to weave together a kete that embraces and carries the children. This is the social fabric that will carry the class through the challenges of adolescence. Success relies on all of the children being held in the parent's consciousness, not just their own child.

Group Structure:

Termly meetings between all class liaison parents and the leaders of the Lower School and High School.

Liaison parent responsibilities:

- Providing a channel for information between the class teacher and the parents
- Maintaining regular contact with the class teacher and offering pro-active assistance
- Helping the teacher organise parent evenings, assisting to set the agenda and taking the minutes (or delegating if unable to attend)
- Being familiar with the parent handbook in order to assist others
- Supporting festivals and organising rosters where needed, e.g. Whitsun
- Working together with the class treasurer to oversee the class bank account
- Helping to develop class fundraising initiatives (though not carrying the responsibility)
- Enlisting parent support for class outings, camps and working bees
- Helping to facilitate or organise social events or off-site meetings between parents and ensuring the teacher is kept informed of these gatherings
- Welcoming new families into the class and facilitating their integration into the school community
- Facilitating and organising class participation in the school fete, held every November. Co-ordinating rosters and food stall management
- Attending termly liaison parent meetings
- Handing over the role to a new Liaison parent for the coming year in Term 4 and attending the Term 4 meeting together to facilitate a smooth handover

The role of Liaison parent is not one of problem solving or mediation. Where there are parent questions or concerns that cannot be easily answered or dealt with, they should be directed to the Teacher, Lower School or High School Associate Principal, or Principal.
