Dear Community

At the end of 2018 the H3 fundraising group had its final meeting for the year it was heart-warming to reflect back on this first year and what has been achieved.

This new initiative raised just over \$5,200. This was achieved through the support of many of you in the community who gave your time in so many ways - baking cakes and biscuits; helping run the Bunnings sausage sizzles; the recycled clothing stall at the Napier Sunday market; creating compress packs; supporting the wonderful Ceilidh that we held earlier in the year; or in donations we have received. This is a huge thank you to you all in coming aboard this new initiative. The money raised has been well spent by subsidising students to receive Eurythmy Therapy, Art Therapy, for students from our school to attend the Leg Up club, and to support our newest in school support programme which is the iLs Listening programme. This year we have had 31 students receive the iLs Listening Programme, and next year we are intending for this number to grow. Over the holidays the H3 fund purchased one of the new kits that we are starting the New Year with. This will enable us to confidently grow our capacity for supporting children. We are also hoping for the iLs Listening Programme to be extended into the High School, which is very exciting.

As teachers it is such a gratifying experience to witness a child being able to access the curriculum more easily due to the support that one of these individualised therapies can offer. We see it as not just supporting the one child. We see the flow on effect of whole class participation and engagement creating cohesive, harmonious classroom environments.

The H3 group looks forward to building on the initiatives that were implemented last year, whilst having some exciting new ideas for fundraising into the future.

Waste Free Wednesday

Last week the lower school teachers visited Omarunui Landfill and what we saw there underlined for us the need to change the way we as a school and as a larger community process and approach waste.

Standing overlooking a huge excavated pit, known as "Valley B", looking down as truck after truck dumped rubbish into this huge man-made hole, we were told that Hawkes Bay is producing more waste than ever before and this site will be filled within six years. Most of the rubbish that is dumped here is green waste and huge amounts of it could be recycled, let alone re-used or passed on.

Although recycling is an option, Gabriel, our guide from the Envirocentre, likened it to an ambulance at the bottom of a cliff: It won't solve the problem, it will just patch it up. New Zealand, and especially Hawkes Bay, lacks the recycling infrastructure to cope with the range of plastics we use so lots of it ends up who knows where as many companies are unwilling or unable to meet the costs of processing the plastic they use. For example, there is nowhere in Hawkes Bay to recycle soft plastic.

We cannot just keep digging holes in the Earth and filling it with rubbish. As a College of Teachers we believe it is our role to transfer the value of kaitiatanga (guardianship) to our tamariki at school. One way this will be seen at school will be Waste Free Wednesday.

On Wednesdays, there will be no bins on the school grounds so children will have to take home rubbish with them, or better still, not bring any potential rubbish to school (eg. cellophane, yoghurt pots, chippie packets, muesli bar wrappers etc). Consider alternatives such as Lillybee wraps, using a large bottle of yoghurt and pouring some into a reusable container and choosing a chippie alternative! The canteen will be open but you will have to take your own container or bag that is big enough for your nachos or mince pie. Containers can be washed out afterwards and left in classrooms.

As teachers we hope that we can reduce the impact that we, as a school, are making on Papatūānuku and we hope that this value can be shared with our tamariki so they too can grow into responsible guardians of our planet.



He pito kõrero!

Ngā mihi mahana o Hine Raumati ki a koutou e te whānau o Taikura.... Warm greetings of the summer to you all of Taikura!

Last week the whole staff took part in a noho-marae at Waimārama marae for two days. The first day was about Te Tiriti o Waitangi – The Treaty of Waitangi, the process of the treaty, the legislation that impacted on Māori and still does, and what we can do. The second day involved looking at the Principles in the 'He Reo Ora' document and beginning to understand what we could all do to enliven Te Reo me ōna Tikanga in our school. We will share more of this during the term. Below are some reflections from participants at our hui.

All staff attended the Marae for our learning experience on the Treaty of Waitangi and how we can weave Te reo into our everyday curriculum. We started the day by being welcomed onto the Marae with a Powhiri, this involved being lead onto the Marae by Te Kaahurangi our kaikaranga and then whaikorero (speeches) by Bayden Barber and Troy Gardiner. We also heard from Bayden about the tangata whenua and their history and connection to the land around Waipuka (Ocean beach). We finished the official welcome with a Hongi and Hariru (pressing of noses and the shaking of hands) and the washing of hands.

Later on in the Wharenui (meeting house) we all had a chance to give our pepeha, which is our way of introducing ourselves and our whakapapa. As the most I have ever said in Māori is 'Kia ora' I was quite nervous about speaking actual sentences. But I did it and was glad that I had challenged myself and come out of my comfort zone. I saw a whakatauki (proverb/saying) which is "Ki mua, ki muri" (go forward looking backwards) and I think this sums up well what I have gained from this experience. **Joanne Doig (Parent and School Gardener)**

Lower School Dress Code

Last year the Lower School teachers came together to discuss the dress code. It was decided to make the following changes.

Part of the Special Character of Taikura is that we do not have a school uniform other than for Sports & P.E classes. The following Dress Code sets out what the School requires to ensure that students' dress is appropriate for school activities and acceptable in appearance.

Students' dress should be suitable for school activities and of neat, tidy and modest appearance. Clothing that is tight and restrictive for movement and/or revealing in nature, is not considered suitable for school wear.

Decoration/Design

The following sets out what is allowed and what is not allowed on all clothing (including jackets), footwear, accessories and jewellery.

Allowed:

- Patterned fabric e.g. striped, spotted, geometric designs, multi-coloured. The pattern must not be offensive (as defined below).
- Small logos (words or designs). Small means smaller than a standard playing card. The logos must not be offensive (as defined below).
- Taikura logo and name on sports clothing, cultural group clothing and school T-shirts.

Not Allowed:

- Words (other than small logos as above)
- Pictures
- Designs or logos larger than a standard playing card
- Designs considered to be offensive

Offensive is defined as anything which depicts demonic themes, violence, death, skull bones or skeletons, gore, drugs, alcohol, smoking, sexual themes, swearing or insulting words, phrases or images.

Modesty/Practicality

Narrow-strapped tops and singlets are not allowed. Shoulders and chest must be covered.

The whole torso must be covered; this means that low riders worn with cropped or short tops are not acceptable. Revealing tops, t-shirts, dresses, skirts, mini skirts and shorts are not acceptable.

Skin-tight shorts, trousers, tights, jeans and other leggings that restrict movement and/or are revealing, are not allowed.

Skirts and shorts must not be no higher than the middle of the wearer's thighs when sitting. This includes shorts and skirts that are worn over the top of tights or leggings.

Transparent or see-through tops are not acceptable unless worn as an overgarment.

Underwear worn as over-dress is not acceptable.

Shorts and trousers should be properly held up around the waist.

Clothing should not be ripped or torn. Designer ripped clothing is also not acceptable.

Hats are not to be worn inside. Hoodies may be worn at school but the hood is to be kept down.

If you have concerns about your child/children's vision or hearing, and they are not being seen by an outside professional, please collect a yellow form from the office and have it filled in and returned before Thursday 4 April, and she will include them.
