Our Community Evening last week provided an opportunity to share a picture of where Taikura is currently as well as to reflect on our journey since our inaugural Community Evening in the final term of last year. At our last meeting I shared that our focus had been on consolidating Taikura's development and refocusing our attention on our Special Character and this is still very much a focus. Added to this is a conscious strengthening of our working together; within the school between the Kindergartens, Lower School and High School, at a governance level between our Board of Trustees and the Proprietors Trust and with our wider community.

Since the end of last year we have moved our office and administration back to the front gate which has enabled this important aspect of our school to be back in the centre of our daily life.

The Memorandum of Understanding which was developed and signed last year between the BOT and Proprietors Trust has resulted in the creation of Sub Committees in the areas of Finance, Health and Safety, Property and Special Character which include representatives from both governing bodies, School Management and staff.

We began this year with a noho marae which included all of our teaching, support and admin staff and provided a context for our continuing Annual Goal work around implementing our He Reo Ora Strategy. This also provided us all with an opportunity to experience what it can be like for our students when they find themselves in new surroundings and the joys and challenges of communal living.

So far this year the Education Review Office have visited both of our Kindergartens and there has been a positive response to both of these visits with staff feeling uplifted about the opportunity to share the varied ways they support the children including through Child Studies and our whole staff professional development that we are currently undertaking on the 12 senses.

At the Community Evening a picture of our work with PB4L was shared, an intention of which is to nurture an environment where our values can be articulated by all consistently and where healthy relationships will flourish. Input from all staff, as well as our students and parent community will be an integral part of this work moving forward.

The important contributions of our parent volunteers on the Board of Trustees were acknowledged in light of the recent nominations and upcoming elections and an update was shared on our progress towards our Strategic Plan.

An appreciation and interest for details was obvious in an overview of current projects on the ten-year property plan given by representatives from the Proprietors Trust. The evening also included a passionate plea from our Parent and Family Association for parent interest in our Special Character.

At our Steiner Teachers Conference in the April holidays a picture was shared of the founding of the first school as a model for how to make the world a more peaceful and just place and develop true human beings. Steiner educates from the inside out, feeding children's imaginations, resourcing them with practical skills, nurturing their senses and inspiring their love of learning before requiring them to create from themselves. As parents and educators we are asked to have interest and a willingness to work towards deepening our own understanding so as to support our children. The effort we are prepared to give to this will determine how Steiner education looks in the next 100 years.

BOT Update

At our Board of Trustees Meeting last week Pippa's report contained concerns raised by staff, particularly in the High School, around the tone of many of the emails they receive from parents. Staff shared that many emails have an aggressive tone and they have asked the BOT to support them in reminding our community of respectful email communication.

Emails do not have the advantage of body language, facial expression or tone of voice to help recipients interpret them. Words therefore tend to be taken at face value. Getting the tone and language right is essential to avoid offence. It is time well spent to ensure you get the tone and etiquette right in your emails.

- Keep emails brief, but include all essential information so your recipient can understand your point of view
- Use simple courtesies like please and thank you
- Do not type in capitals
- Accurately reflect your emails content in the subject line
- Review each email before sending to ensure your message is clear and polite
- When tempted to send an emotionally charged email, walk away from your computer and wait a while before sending.

Most importantly, when there is a misunderstanding by email, don't hesitate to pick up the phone and have a conversation.

Our teachers work hard and have the best interests of our tamariki at heart, they must be treated with courtesy and respect.
