

In the Northern Hemisphere, Mid-Winter falls a few days before Christmas Day and the celebration of the birth of Jesus, who became the bearer of the Christ Spirit. For the North, this is a mighty symbol of the coming of new light into the world, and that the darkness shall be overcome. What of us here in the Southern Hemisphere? Is there any way of reconciling the Christ Spirit with our own winter time? One possible way of looking at it, is that since Golgotha and Easter, the Christ Being has united himself fully with the very life of the earth, has ensouled the earth and all its people with his own being and that he accompanies the destiny of the earth and each one of us in all time to come. He accompanies the soul life of the earth in all its cycles in time, large and small.

Beginning in spring and on into summer, the earth itself breathes out in burgeoning growth and new life into the far heavens. We give ourselves up to sun, sea and manifold outer sense experiences. Come autumn, this out breath turns and the earth starts to breathe in again, reaching the fullest point at Mid-Winter. Now the earth is very much within itself, quietly contained. The outer world of nature is diminished and the seeds of summer lie waiting, repositories of all the sun and warmth of summer. Here in Hawke's Bay, where the pause seems comparatively brief (with freesias sprouting, etc) Mid-Winter is typified by a day when the sky is a close, thick, pearly blanket, through which the sun weakly and dimly shines. One feels encapsulated in a cold, still, quiet world. In Europe this would be a day when the snow thickly blankets everything and all is silent.

When the surrounding world is like this, we tend to feel ourselves more acutely in our innermost being, more actively than was possible in our 'out and about' days. In these quiet winter moments, perhaps inside by the fire, we more naturally connect to our own sense of self, contemplate, take stock, review. As our environment engenders more inward focus we come nearer to our essential being, and our own sense of the Spirit. Through being closer to our own Spirit life, our inner light, we can consciously or unconsciously draw nearer to the light of the world, the spirit of evolving humanity. Perhaps this holds good for the soul life of the earth itself at this time, quiet on the outside yet more awake to itself from within. Has Christ accompanied this deep in-breath of the earth; is his being active within the very heart of the Earth at this time? Of course, it is interesting to remember, the exact opposite process of out breathing is going on in the Northern Summer.

For the children of the Lower and Middle school, the light in their lantern symbolises this Spirit spark within them that can grow and strengthen throughout life and overcome darkness of soul night; hate, fear, hopelessness, prejudice etc. As students of Class 7 physics know in their light studies, the smallest light is enough to dispel otherwise total darkness.

For the High School, by consciously placing tea lights on to parts of a large world map, they are pinpointing a place where people are experiencing dark times and need our thoughts and prayers, or else it might be also acknowledging where light is shining and draw attention to it. Be it literal or figurative, the light that each of us carries within us can be acknowledged and encouraged to shine out. Each student who wishes to do so, lights a tea light and places it on the world map in the place of which they are thinking. They accompany this with a few words of the good wishes they want to send a place of suffering if that is what they have chosen. Alternatively if it is something which they want to acknowledge as already bringing some light to the world they add their light, thoughts and words to that place to help make that light stronger. After this has been carried out in a quiet and thoughtful mood and after we have heard some words of inspiration from an invited speaker, we all go out to a place where teachers and students have prepared us a warm nourishing soup to share communally following our communal bringing of warm thoughts and light.

The Little Lantern song used sometimes in the younger classes procession might therefore point to a deep truth.

When days are darkest The Earth enshrines, The seeds of Summer's birth The Spirit of All is a light that shines Deep in the darkness of Earth.

Ngā Mata o te Ariki Tāwhirimātea – The Eyes of the God Tāwhirimātea – Mata ariki; or more commonly known as Matariki, is the cluster of whetū (stars) that can be seen anew each year during the months of June and July. Dr Rangi Matamua in his book *Matariki: Star of the Year* has stated that this year Matariki will rise again between the 24 – 28 of June, heralding the Māori New Year, however, this whetū can be seen for most of the year. The focus for 'He pito kōrero' over the next month will be to share kōrero about the specific whetū, pūrākau (stories), whakatauki (proverbs), and some of the events at Taikura and in our rohe (region) that are part of our Matariki celebrations.

Title: Beach Litter Trip

The sun came out last week for Class 2 and Class 6's beach litter audit at Te Ātea a Rangi in conjunction with the charity Sustainable Coastlines. Our day started at school with a presentation by Ben Knight about how our beaches are being polluted by plastics, what we should do to tackle this problem and what Taikura's role would be. Sustainable Coastlines, along with the Department of Conservation, Statistics New Zealand and the Ministry of the Environment have established a rigorous litter database to map the current state of littering on New Zealand's beaches. This database will be publicly available and of a sufficient scientific standard to inform government policy. Taikura has committed to doing a termly litter audit of the beach at Te Ātea a Rangi over the next 2-3 years to sample the amount of litter present and enter it onto the national database. It is hoped that this will strengthen our tamariki's connection to this beach, encourage them in their role of kaitiaki of our coastline and possibly lead to local action to mitigate our litter problem.

On a Scale of A-D, A being very clean to D being full of litter, Ben rated the beach as a C, which meant there was lots of litter to pick up. As Class 2 walked north to carry out a litter pick up with the fantastic whanau support, Class 6 were given the task of mapping out a 100m by 20m area and of picking up every scrap of litter in that space. Class 6 got so involved that they voluntarily continued their beach tidy up outside of the audit area. The collected litter was audited back at school and the results were input immediately onto the national database. This stage of the audit had direct links to the maths curriculum, with Class 6 weighing, sorting and entering data.

As you can see from the picture, most of the litter was plastic. Closer investigation of what we pick up over time at the beach could lead the classes to take action on a local level, but at this moment the data will serve to paint a picture of the state of litter pollution at this moment in time at this one, special beach.
