Waharoa Blessing

Tēnā koutou katoa

Friday 28 June will be a very special day for Taikura, because it is the day during Matariki on which we will bless the new waharoa (entrance way) to our school's Whare.

The symbolism of entering through a waharoa is like passing from one state to another, similar to what happens when people are welcomed onto a marae. Our Whare is soon to be enhanced by a beautiful waharoa, so that when our tamariki and rangatahi go to their lessons, their transition into Te Ao Maori can be enhanced.

At the end of 2018, a group of Class 9 ākonga worked with whakairo rākau tutor Nathan Foote during Craft Week to design and carve a waharoa out of hardwood power poles that were donated to the school by Unison. Luna Kirchner, Rose Brooker, Kail MacKenzie, Oliver Bart, Isaac Cox, Eamon Carroll, Bayden MacKenzie, Aléjandro Correa, Richard Simpson, Baxter Barron and Rory Merwood were the ākonga involved. The result is a very beautiful and meaningful entranceway to te Whare. The waharoa represents female and male energies in the pou on either side, and the crossbeam carries a carving of our Taikura heart-wood symbol.

We warmly invite our school community to share in the dawn blessing of this legacy piece of craft work. We are very fortunate to have kaumatua Jerry Hapuku facilitate the whakamānawa (blessing) for us. We will gather at 6:30am on Friday 28 June at the Whare. Please RSVP to office@taikura.school.nz by 3:00pm on Monday 24 June at the latest, with the number and names of your whanau who would like to attend (we need a clear number for catering purposes).

Kīwaha o te wiki ... Phrase of the week!

Matariki

This year 2019 Matariki rises in the east on June 25 and is read on the Tangaroa nights of the Kahungunu Maramataka, 25 – 28 June. The celebration period is 25 June – 2 July. July 3 is Whiro (New Moon) and is the first night of the Māori New Year. There are many stories about Matariki and this is one of them.

I te timatanga – in the beginning, there was only darkness, nothing but night. And in the darkness, two beings – Ariki – lay together.

They were **Ranginui**, the father, and **Papatūānuku**, the mother. They had many children, and for a time all was peaceful. But the children started to grow. They became restless and fidgety. Two of the youngest brothers, **Mokohuruhuru and Uepoto** went exploring one day to the edges of the space between their parents. It was there that they saw a distant light, piercing the darkness through a gap in the embrace of Ranginui and Papatūānuku. Mokohuruhuru and Uepoto hurried back to share what they had seen, and wānanga between the brothers began.

Some of the brothers suggested separating their parents. Others disagreed and as they argued their space became more cramped and the children became more restless and frustrated. Attempts were made to create more space. Despite protest from some of the tamariki who were happy to remain between their parents, others felt trapped and took turns pushing and struggling. Rangi and Papa could feel this and became aware of what was happening – someone was pushing them apart!

Finally, it was **Tāne** who separated his parents with support from his brothers. Ranginui was sent upward to become Sky Father, and Papatūānuku downward to become Earth Mother. There was light – Te Ao Mārama. The children were free at last. Ranginui was so sad his tears fell as rain upon Papa, but someone else was sad too. **Tāwhirimātea**, Ariki of the winds, felt sad for his parents – he cried tears of lightning. In his pain and sadness he tore his eyes out, crushed them in his hands and threw them into the heavens. His eyes became the star cluster we call **Matariki – short for Ngā Mata o te Ariki Tawhirimatea, eyes of the God Tāwhirimātea.**

NZ Music Commission Mentor Visit

Earlier in term two we were given the opportunity to have a specialist mentor visit Taikura. Tipene is from the Hawkes Bay, now based in Auckland and has worked with artists such as Maisey Rika, Troy Kingi, The Wailers, Bone Thugs N Harmony, Fiji, J Boog and Joe Walsh (The Eagles). Tipene showed students the art of song writing, matching syllables in words to create powerful lyrics. He also gave insights into production techniques using the latest professional software Logic Pro X, to give students the skills to produce industry quality recordings.

Thursday 20 June the day before the Solstice The High School Festival for winter will take place during the day. It is celebrated in the hall with a world map, candles, a talk and thoughts of a global nature. Class Seven joins the High school rather than the Lower School for this festival.

The Lower School Lantern Festival starts at 6:00 pm that night.

Classes one to six children are to be dropped to their class and parents make their way to the big field outside the gym. (Inside the gym if it is wet.) You will be directed to make a large circle around a spiral on the ground and there you will await the classes. Following a bell at 6:15 pm the children will come from their rooms, lanterns lit, and walk to the field.

We will start with a community song (see below - bring on the night). During this evening Classes one - three will walk the spiral and we will hear songs or music from Classes four, five and six.

When the evening is complete we encourage families to make their way carefully and quietly back to cars and home, saving the magic of the light and sound and spiral, to talk about over hot chocolate and a biscuit in the warmth of home!

At the conclusion of the festival students return to their classes with their teacher. We ask that parents collect their children from their respective classrooms as quickly and as quietly as possible.


Achievement Acknowledgement

- o If poor weather kōrero will be inside the heated marquee with a portable Planetarium




What to bring:




