# Universal Fabric

My middle child is in the class with the most Steiner School students as Steiner School parents at Taikura. Looking around the circle at meetings I think half of us went to a Steiner school! It makes for lively meetings I can tell you!

A surprising personal side effect is discovering the similarities in our very individual experiences of school. The parent who went to a Steiner School in Norway and the mum who went to the school here in Hastings and me, who went to the Auckland School can all remember the same moments in terms of significant happenings, main lessons, exercises and projects. It brings a wonderful collegiality to our friendships and shared knowledge of what our children are now experiencing.

That universality within such a personal journey as education works across the schools but also through time. My children have knitted specific items at the same age that I did, they have undertaken in depth plant study at the age I did, fallen in love with Loki, become entangled in the whakapapa of Greek Gods, sung in rounds, played the chimes, pondered projective geometry, tackled Shakespeare, built tiny dwellings out of mud and sticks. There's a 30 plus year gap but the threads across our experiences give us a shared fabric that has helped form us.

With the help of social media I now follow the journeys of Steiner Schools around the world. I've never been to some of these places but the parallels make me feel like part of a bigger universe. I particularly enjoy seeing what's happening at the Philadelphia School, so steadfast and assured, vibrant, optimistic and proud. Closer to home, the Motueka School is inspiring with its pioneering spirit.

There are people too who I have a ridiculous affinity with because they have a direct link to a Steiner School. Jennifer Aniston went to one in New York and I feel we could talk for hours! Tilda Swinton's kids go to one in Scotland and that pretty much makes us best buds!

Day to day our School can feel like an intimate, cosy country school but for the rest of our children's lives they will be intrinsically connected to a wider community of people who share an experience of themselves and their world they can pin directly to their Steiner education. There's a security and a warmth in that that's priceless in our busy, big world.

# He pito kõrero!

Matariki

Our tipuna named the stars of Matariki and each one holds a special message for the year ahead. **Matariki**, the brightest of all in the star cluster, watches over all the stars and is connected to the health and wellbeing of people. **Waitī** mean fresh water, and **Waitā** is salt water. They represent the creatures you find in rivers, lakes and oceans, like fish, tuna and other foods of the sea. **Tupuānuku** is connected to all the foods that grow in the earth, and **Tupuārangi** to the fruit, berries and birds in the trees. **Waipunārangi** means water that pools in the sky, and our tipuna looked to her for signs about the weather, and rainfall for the coming year. They would talk to **Ururangi** about the wind. The oldest kuia whetū, **Põhutukawa** offers guidance to the spirits of our loved ones who have passed away and carries them across the night sky to be returned to the heavens as stars. Finally te pēpi, **Hiwa-i-te-Rangi**, is the star you wish upon. In the time of our ancestors when Matariki first rose on the correct night, our tipuna would dig a trench in the garden and those with wishes in their heart would stand in the trench, have soil packed around their feet and plant their wishes in the soil. Tohunga would recite the following karakia:

Ko Tawhito-uru-ngangana, Ko Hiwanui, ko Hiwaroa, ko Hiwapukenga, ko Hiwawananga, ko Hiwa i te rangi Takataka te kahui o te rangi, Ko iā Pou, tō putanga, ki te whai ao, ki te ao marama!

Hiwa! Great Hiwa, Wonderful Hiwa, Hiwa the star Come down from the stars in the heaven and plant my wishes in the soil, make them grow and make them come true. (Nā Rangi Matamua te whakamārama nei).

Matariki is present for most of the year but disappears from the night sky in early winter. When the stars appear again mid-winter and the new moon has risen, it is the beginning of the Māori New Year. The old stories tell us that when the stars shine brightly the year will be warm and good for kai. The weather will be kind and there will be plenty of fish and berries to gather and plants will grow tall and strong.

We can celebrate Matariki in many ways. It is a time for learning about our Atua, our tangible (the land, waterways, natural resources) and intangible tāonga (te reo me ōna tikanga, whakapapa, stories and history) and how to protect and practice these in our daily lives. It is a time for hearing stories of the old days and about how people used the stars in the past. It is a time to plant trees and winter crops, to fish and gather kaimoana. It is a time for creating, and a time to make plans for the coming year. It is a time to remember our loved ones passed and to spend time with whānau and friends. It is a time for sharing kai together.

# **Finance Update**

Below is an update of our donations for both Kindergarten and School Special Character Donations.
