Last week Erena Tomoana shared a korero with our College of Teachers about Matariki and the local Maramataka (Māori lunar calendar) and the links between the two, based on research she is undertaking. During her korero she reminded us of the annual rhythms which are so closely connected to the physical world and all who live within it as well as the power that the moon has to pull oceans in and out. # Mirjam Stevens

Mirjam Stevens was born 1 May 1937 in Luzern, Switzerland, near a lake and surrounded by mountains. Her father worked for the postal service and her mother was house proud. Both her parents were anthroposophists, vegetarians and Protestant in a Catholic community. So life was not always easy and Mirjam had an early sense and interest in matters of life outside of what would have been considered "the norm", even within her own family. This eventuated when Mirjam left home for England, having trained and worked as a primary school teacher for seven years. In England, Mirjam worked in an anthroposophical home for children from disadvantaged backgrounds. There she met her future husband John Stevens. After their wedding John trained as a Waldorf teacher. Later, with



their first child, they boarded the five pound Oriana for New Zealand. This was in response to a teaching vacancy at Queenswood (now Taikura).

After Mirjam and John's third child was born, Mirjam taught French and German to classes 1-4. In 1981 when the fourth sibling was three years old, Mirjam began a new role as a Nursery "teacher". Mirjam remained at the Kindergarten teaching until shortly after John's passing in 1995. Mirjam stayed connected to the school community playing the piano for many Eurythmy lessons and performances. Just last year, feeling the need to stay connected to the community she was passionate about, Mirjam expressed an interest in visiting the Kindergarten as a Nanny. However, Mirjam was drawn to joining the Playgroup which she only managed to visit for a short while before Christmas 2018, when a significant health issue prevented her from driving. This last, short phase of Mirjam's life was filled with taking part in as many community events as she could find rides to. Mirjam passed away peacefully on 25 May 2019, surrounded by family. On behalf of Mirjam, we would like to thank all community friends and whanau for your support.

# **BoT Update**

Our meeting was held last Monday 24 June. A big thank you to departing Trustee Jessica Soutar Barron for all the work she has done during her time on the Board. We welcomed Scott Wynands and Jason Reidpath as newly elected members, and introduced them to our systems and processes.

A question was raised around sponsorship of sports uniforms, and a decision was made that as a school we would not enter into commercial relationships with people or companies. It doesn't align with our values to use children to advertise, or with our dress code expectations. We do, of course, welcome donations towards uniforms and other such items, and these will be acknowledged personally. There has been some clarification regarding school camp funds, and policies will be amended to reflect the following: Where there is a surplus of camp funds of over \$50 per family, the funds will be reimbursed, where there is a deficit of up to \$50, families will be expected to cover this cost. All camp organisers work very hard to avoid this and to budget correctly, but at times these situations can occur, and it is important to have a process in place.

Jordan Wilkin is our High School student representative on the Board, he shared that at a recent student council meeting the subject of lateness was discussed. It has been an issue in the High School, and there has been a focus during this last term. There have been many detentions, both at lunch time and after school, but with the teachers ensuring their approach to the issue is consistent, and the students understanding the consequences, progress is being made.

The Education Review Office will be visiting our school in August, more details to follow.
