Dinners became a bit later because it didn't matter. Stories were read and it all seemed very normal and safe. Once the kids were asleep I could stretch out and watch the shows which I never usually had time to watch. I found time to read. It was wonderful.

I realise that this is all coming from a position of privilege, from a place of job security in a small town in a country where there was no pandemic. But I have come out the other side, with a real sense of the need to slow down, to take a breath, to make time for myself and for my family and to really value that handshake in the morning.

He pito kõrero!

This year 2020 Matariki rises in the east, from 13–16 July. The celebration period is 13–20 July. As this is in the school holidays, we thought it would be good to share whakatauki (proverbs), ways of celebrating and acknowledging Matariki and the story that was shared last year by Erena Tomoana.

I te timatanga – in the beginning, there was only darkness, nothing but night. And in the darkness, two beings – Ariki – lay together. They were **Ranginui** the father, and **Papatūānuku** the mother. They had many children, and for a time all was peaceful. But the children started to grow. They became restless and fidgety. Two of the youngest brothers, **Mokohuruhuru** and **Uepoto** went exploring one day to the edges of the space between their parents. It was there that they saw a distant light, piercing the darkness through a gap in the embrace of Ranginui and Papatūānuku. Mokohuruhuru and Uepoto hurried back to share what they had seen, and wānanga between the brothers began.

Some of the brothers suggested separating their parents. Others disagreed and as they argued their space became more cramped and the children became more restless and frustrated. Attempts were made to create more space. Despite protest from some of the tamariki who were happy to remain between their parents, others felt trapped and took turns pushing and struggling. Rangi and Papa could feel this and became aware of what was happening – someone was pushing them apart! Finally, it was **Tāne** who separated his parents with support from his brothers. Ranginui was sent upward to become Sky Father, and Papatūānuku downward to become Earth Mother. There was light – Te Ao Mārama.

The children were free at last. Ranginui was so sad his tears fell as rain upon Papa, but someone else was sad too...To be continued!

Whakatauki – Proverb

Matariki tapuapua

Matariki, the season when water lies in pools. Kua takoto har̄otoroto mai te wai i te whenua.

The saying is used to describe the heavy rains of winter.

He pito kōrero is a space dedicated to celebrating and promoting Te Reo me ōna Tikanga Māori.



Finance update

Before we all entered lockdown, both the finance committee and management group looked at the donations received for 2019. Overall the donations received improved significantly on previous years, with an increase of total potential donation increasing from 61% to 69%. When comparing this to 2017, we were as low as 50% of families paying donations. The Trust appreciate the commitment families have made towards supporting the school through donations.

We also looked at donation levels at a class level and were pleased to see that our class one whānau in 2019 had the highest donations paid in comparison to total potential, which was 89%. Congratulations class one (now class 2 in 2020). I will be making last year's donation information available to all class liaison parents.

We are still awaiting some families to return their 2020 donation forms. Donation forms are available at the office. We rely on donation forms to gauge an expectation of what we may receive for the year and how we can best allocate these funds to the school.
