This week we celebrate our Spring Festival and it is wonderful to be able to open our gates and welcome our parents and whanau to join us for this celebration of the new season. This term, like this year as a whole, continues to be challenging at school. A number of evenings, camps, sports, day trips and weekly school activities have had to be either cancelled, postponed or a new format has had to be found in order to comply with the national Alert Levels. For many of our students, staff and parents the uncertainty and disruption has impacted life outside of school also. The arrival of spring, which is heralded by the blossoms, new growth, warmer and longer days is a timely reminder that, despite the uncertainty and disruption, the rhythm of the year keeps moving.

Last Saturday Class 12 students presented their Class 12 Project speeches. These speeches were delivered with humour, enthusiasm, confidence, relief and a sprinkling of nerves. Like the seasons, these projects have a rhythm within our school year, a breathing in and out and the presentation of the speeches is the culmination of nearly a twelve-month process. The projects provide a moment to pause and acknowledge our students, to acknowledge the journey these students have been on, not just through their project but their educational journey also. The projects provide an opportunity to see the individuals in the class emerging as they begin to prepare for the next stage in their journey that will take them beyond Taikura. While the projects are a cause for celebration students have little time to pause and reflect as the completion of this task does not symbolise an end point but rather marks the first step of the transition towards graduation. For Class 12, Term Four includes exams, the end of their formal assessment, their final class camp, cushion concert, prize giving, graduation dinner and the carol evening, all of which are significant milestones in marking the end of their twelve-year journey.

While the final term of the year is significant for our graduating students it is also a busy time across our school and kindergartens. A number of classes have camps planned, summer sports get underway, our senior students complete their qualification requirements for the NZ Certificate in Steiner Education, our Annual Plan is reviewed and planning begins for 2021 and preparations get underway to support the transition from kindergarten to school for our six year olds. As a community plans are underway for our annual Fete, we will be in touch early next term around a community meeting and we look forward to coming together to celebrate at our Carol Evening at the end of the year.

Over the coming holiday break my wish is that our staff and students are able to take a complete break from school. For some this may involve switching off and disconnecting devices and picking up a good book or a paintbrush or heading outside in the spring sunshine, either to explore our beautiful country or get our hands dirty in our own back yard. For some it may be finding some quiet time while for others it may be about connecting with friends and whānau. Equally it could be a combination of all of the above.

I wish you all a wonderful holiday and look forward to welcoming you back next term.

At Taikura kindergarten our tamariki and ngā kaiako gathered in the shade of the rākau and sang a few waiata together. one of them being:


