I hope you have all had a wonderful summer break and I welcome you all back to this new school year. Over recent months I have spoken to many parents, friends, whānau and staff who have loved ones overseas and there has been a recurring theme shared of how fortunate we have been in Aotearoa with the freedom to travel, socialise and enjoy the summer sunshine, at our beaches, lakes, rivers, neighbourhoods and homes.

The start of the new term marks the beginning of a new journey for all of us at Taikura. We have new students and staff who are joining us and other staff and students who are returning after time away. For each of our classes and their teachers an opportunity to reconnect with each other while at the same time having a new curriculum and developmental year to explore and experience.

We have new children and their whānau who are just beginning their educational journey with their first week in our kindergartens. The transition of our Class One children from kindergarten to school, which began at our Carol Evening at the end of last year, was completed at our Powhiri on Monday morning. Class 8 ended last year by saying farewell to their Class teacher and they have spent this week orientating themselves in the High School, finding new classrooms and meeting new teachers. Nearing the end of the journey are our Class 12 students who are settling in for their final year at Taikura, finalising academic programmes and Class 12 project topics and shouldering the mantle of being role models and leaders for our younger classes.

Over the holidays work has continued around our grounds and buildings including painting, new carpets, and the redistribution of a number of our teaching and learning spaces. In Taikura House the school has now extended into all of Level 2 with new High School classrooms and work spaces. Our middle school classes have found a new home at the top of the Edwin Ayre building alongside our Lower School SENCO, and our Extra Lesson and Listening Programme spaces have moved back to the Katherine Laing building making them a great deal more accessible to our Lower School children. Matua Troy has established a temporary learning space on the ground floor of Taikura House for this year and we look forward to sharing the planning for the new whare as that process gets underway.

With the return of all of our staff and students this week our grounds and rooms are full of a lively and positive energy and there is an enjoyment and appreciation in having the opportunity to reconnect with each other and an excitement at the possibilities that this year can hold. The possibilities of plays, projects, camps, day trips, sporting endeavours, new skills to be mastered and shared, friendships to enjoy and adventures to be had.

He pito kõrero!

Ngā mihi mahana o Hineraumati ki a koutou e te whānau o Taikura! Ko te tūmanako, kua haumanu te tinana, kua tau hoki te wairua mā koutou i ēnei rā whakatā! Warm greetings of the summer and I hope you are all well and rested from the holidays!

The beginning for the whole staff was a Treaty of Waitangi workshop with Te Huia Bill Hamilton. I have taken part in a number of Treaty workshops over the years and each one has brought a different experience and new learning. One of the aspects that was interwoven throughout this workshop was our tamariki. The following understanding of this kupu comes from Doctor Rose Pere's book Te Wheke – A celebration of infinite wisdom:

'Tama is derived from Tama-nui-te-rā the central sun, the divine spark; ariki refers to senior most status, and riki on its own can mean smaller version. Tamariki is the Māori word used for children. Children are the greatest legacy the world community has.'

This was a powerful way to remind us all of the task of a teacher and our responsibilities as educators to uphold the principles of the Treaty of Waitangi, the founding document of our State.

As you walk past the 'Community Notice Board', you will see a copy of the Treaty in both Te Reo Māori and English. As part of my lessons this week, I have been taking students to this space and discussing in a very broad sense the articles of the Treaty and some of the misunderstandings through the translation and kupu mino – transliterate words utilised in the document that were foreign concepts for Māori at that time. However, a whakatauki – proverb that Bill shared with us at the time resonated strongly for all and was focused around our tamariki, for me can be applied to the ongoing learning of our stories and history from this whenua.

'Miria te pounamu, e pīata ana'

Polish the greenstone, so it will shine!

He pito korero will be a part of our weekly Grapevine and for Whaea Kura (our school librarian) and I it is a space that we would like to invite people within our whanau whanui – wider community to be able to share their own korero about aspects of Te Ao Maori that would be beneficial for all to read about if you want to. Class One Playground

A reminder that the Class One playground is not to be used by children and families at pick up and drop off times. It can be very distracting for our new learners to have playground activity going on outside the window while they are still in class. In addition to this there are times when this playground is used as a withdrawal space for those children who need it. There are tikanga practises around the use of our playgrounds at school, which can become blurred when parents and whānau have a different approach to the supervision and the rules for their children. Sports News - Taikura Surf Club

Brendan and I have been looking at solutions to keep the school's Friday Surf Club going in 2021. For the school to run such a club it is required that a trained surf instructor or lifeguard is present and in charge for the afternoon. We were lucky to have Clayton who was a trained surf instructor, teacher and competent surfer running the club previously. We have explored options of contracting in people qualified in this area with no luck to date, however we are lucky to have Brendan Hamilton-Gibbs our Class 6 teacher and current senior lifeguard, competent ocean swimmer and surfer willing to take some Surf Friday sessions this term. With his commitment to the Waimarama Surf club he will not be available every Friday.

Every **Wednesday** it will be written on the school notice blackboard by the canteen if Surf Friday is happening that week. The information will also be sent out on the school app. If there are any parents that are competent surfers with current qualifications as an instructor or lifeguard who may be interested to help out please contact Brendan or Janet at school.

The surf club is an informal meeting of students and parents at Waimarama beach on Friday after school from 4:00 pm. School boards are used for basic lessons, and surfing practice. More competent students can attend with their own boards. All students require a parent supervisor, as in, it is **not** a drop your child off session. Often parents have a go as well if there are spare boards available with some then enjoying a fish and chip dinner with other families post surf. This year we will have a koha tin that we hope students will contribute to as a way to help offset the ongoing costs of the upkeep of the school boards. A gold coin from everyone each session will help.
