This year one of our Annual Goals is focused on storytelling, in particular that our student's soul and spiritual needs are met through the story curriculum. This Annual Goal aligns with our curriculum focused Strategic Goal which states that our Steiner/Waldorf curriculum inspires well-rounded lifelong learners, who are able to successfully step into the world of their time and that our curriculum is meeting the child through the lens of human development as described by our Special Character.

Stories are the life blood of a Steiner school and it is important for us to value and tell them properly. They are significant within our curriculum, having a prominent place within both our Main Lesson and our practice lesson programmes. Stories are used across the kindergarten and school as a way to share a picture of our festivals with our students, both as a preparation for a particular festival and as part of the festival celebration itself. Our beautiful library actively and positively supports staff and students in accessing stories which support our curriculum and the learning as well as the intention of fostering a love for reading and stories in all. Stories are not confined to the page, they are retold from memory and are also frequently shared through dramatic performances with puppet shows in the kindergarten, class plays and Eurythmy performances and our annual Shepherds play, a Christmas gift from our staff to our students and community.

What is needed to tell a good story is imagination, the capacity to build pictures so that the story ignites something. Imagination is nourishment, soul food, and stories can nourish the person who tells them as well as those who listen to them.

We have a rich story curriculum at Taikura which begins in the kindergarten and junior years with fairy tales, folk tales and the nature stories which develop a love of plants and animals in our children. In Class Three "The Māori creation stories connect the children to the spiritual context of Aotearoa New Zealand;" as stated in our curriculum document and this is grown and strengthened over the following years. The later years of the Lower School curriculum are a treasure trove of stories as students journey through the ancient civilisations and their mythologies. In Class Seven there are the stories of voyaging and discovery and in Class Eight biographies play a significant part in the curriculum. The High School curriculum includes examples of classical literature as well as contemporary stories. Traditional texts include the *Odyssey of Homer* and *Parzival* and these sit alongside stories told through film, poetry, firsthand accounts and retellings of events which help provide alternative viewpoints or examples of experience which are relevant to the issues of our time but also the developmental stages of our young people.

This passion for stories extends actively into our students who can be seen arriving at school with a book in their hands, some having to pull themselves away from the word on the page to shake hands at the gate. It is also not uncommon to find students snuggled up on a cushion reading during lunchtime or listening as another student reads to them. Many of the parents who we meet as part of our special character interviews also share a love for stories and the part they play in bed time routines and the opportunities for connection they provide.

As part of our Annual Goal staff are reviewing the stories that we tell as well as how and when they are told. This includes looking at the archetypal stories of our Steiner/Waldorf Curriculum as well as our local stories to ensure that all are included and valued.

Vision and Hearing Technician School Visit

Lynley Keehan, the Hastings Vision and Hearing Technician is visiting the school on Wednesday 18 August. She will be carrying out standard tests for distance vision with some of the Class 5, 6 & 7 students - this happens every year for all students in New Zealand, and is helpful for picking up on simple vision issues which may not have been previously identified. She sometimes checks other students too, for example, if there is no record of your children having had a Before School Screen or if they need to be re-screened; for these exceptions, I will send home a letter to inform you that Lynley would like to see them. If you have concerns about your child/children's vision or hearing, and they are not being seen by an outside professional, please collect a yellow form from the office and have it filled in and returned before Friday 13 August and she will include them too.

- Suspended by club and have membership removed (along with any dependants).
- If behaviour is of a more serious nature authorities may become involved.
