E te tī, e te tā, kua rewa a Matariki!

Matariki has now risen and as part of our Matariki celebrations, there will be a gathering at the Ātea-a-rangi – The Star Compass, at Waitangi Reserve in Clive, on Friday 9 July at 5:45 am! Piripi Smith will give a talk about Matariki and show us where this cluster can be seen and what is happening with Te whanau marama – Māori astronomy.

### He pito kõrero!

Te wahanga tuatoru (Part 3) - continuation of the Matariki story from last week...

Matariki is present for most of the year but disappears from the night sky in early winter. When the stars appear again in the middle of winter and the new moon has risen, it is the beginning of the Māori New Year. The old stories tell us that when the stars shine brightly, the year will be warm and good for kai, the weather will be kind, and there will be plenty of fish and berries to gather, and plants will grow tall and strong.

We can celebrate Matariki in many ways. It is a time for learning about our Atua, our tangible (the land, waterways, natural resources) and intangible tāonga (te reo me ōna tikanga, whakapapa, stories and history), and how to protect and practice these in our daily lives. It is a time for hearing stories of the old days and about how people used the stars in the past. It is a time to plant trees and winter crops, to fish and gather kaimoana. It is a time for creating, and a time to make plans for the coming year. It is a time to remember our loved ones passed, and spend time with whānau and friends.

The following is an invitation for people to take part in a 'Matariki moment', from Te Taurawhiri i te reo Māori – The Māori Language Commission:

Celebrate the Māori New Year, we invite you to organise a Matariki moment. Invite your whānau and friends to a shared kai, (or virtually share kai if you are not able to be together) then learn how to say the kaikōhau (expression of hope) below, to use at your kaitahi – meal together.

Nau mai ngā hua Nau mai ngā pai Nau mai kia nui Kia hāwere ai

Welcome all things that have grown Welcome all things that are good May they be plentiful and abundant

He pito kōrero is a space dedicated to celebrating and promoting Te Reo me ōna Tikanga Māori.

### Sustainable Coastlines

**Class 4** have been spending lots of time learning about their local environment, its history and why and how we should look after it. On Friday, Class 4 went to the beach at Te Atea a Rangi to start the process of their first beach litter audit. It was a brisk day, the waves were crashing and the wind was blowing but they worked carefully and efficiently and cleared a 100 m x 40 m area of the beach of every scrap of litter to analyse. Beer cans, drink bottles, fishing gear and a car tyre were among some of the rubbish found and, by teaming up with the organisation Sustainable Coastlines, Class 4 will be analysing this beach litter and will input their findings into a national database which directs governmental



policy. This will also offer the class an opportunity to act locally to see if they can do anything to keep this bit of our local coastline litter free. We'll keep you posted.



### Access to Period Products

We are very pleased to let you know that our kura has opted into this government initiative. We now have pads and tampons - regular and super - available at school. The products are easy for students to use at school and will meet a range of different age, developmental, and cultural needs. Our kura is able to order enough products for young people to use for their whole cycle, based on an average of 20 items per young person per month. There will be a mix of brands.

Periods are a normal part of life for half our population and no one should miss school because of their period. Periods usually start between 10 and 16 years of age. Young people can't always access the products they need to feel comfortable at school and sometimes they may simply get caught unprepared. Whatever the reason, free period products for young people who need them means that they don't have to miss school because of their period. Our products are available in baskets in the individual cubicles located in the toilets in Levels 2 and 3 of Taikura House, the Edwin Ayre building and the gym. Should students need products at eurythmy or at the office they are able to ask discreetly.

Using the products is not compulsory. Young people are free to make their own choices about what they use and can continue to bring products from home if they prefer.

If you as a parent or caregiver have any questions or concerns about period products being available to any young person in your whānau, please do not hesitate to contact us.
