Breath

Often in Waldorf education you hear about breath - about how the curriculum breathes, and tasks which are a breathing out task, or a breathing in task.

What does all this breathing talk mean?

In Steiner Pedagogy it is very much the case with 'breathing' that we don't teach it as such, but that it is something which we do. Something the children experience through the setup of the lesson, the day, the planning of the week and the year. Some of these rhythms are natural such as the breathing of the earth experienced through the seasons.

Observing the festivals and following the seasons is a bigger cycle. When thinking of festival activities, the experience of a child going through a mid-winter spiral as a more inward experience, compared to that of dancing the maypole, or later the school Fete where it is a much more outward and out-breathing experience. (In earlier times over summer, the festival activity would have been traditional fire jumping ceremonies etc.)

The way the teacher maps out their curriculum year can encompass these thoughts, where the Main Lessons slowly involve more need for concentration and in breath through the middle terms and out towards the summer term, with camps and other outdoor activities. The teacher also works to balance the lessons focused on *doing* with those focused on *thinking*.

Then we come down to the actual week, where the rhythm of the week has its own reality. Monday, the moon day of reflection, taking in the picture of the story, image, outline of the week's lesson, to Tuesday, Mars day, where one really has to grapple and fight a little with the nitty gritty to Wednesday where there is more of an artistic and rhythmic healing mercurial aspect to the work, to Thursday Jupiter's day where one can treat the day as a little Sunday and forget a little about the struggle of what we are working to grasp and go on a related outing or complete activities with a slightly different quality. This is a small special day - this is also reflected in the life of the teachers at Taikura. Thursday is the day of our weekly Pedagogical Meeting and also our child-studies, the child-study where teachers work together with help from the spiritual world, working to better understand and respond to the students that come before us. Lastly on to Friday when the work of the week is wrapped up so to speak, brought together in warmth and with a sense of accomplishment. The class together with their teacher, looking with love back on the work of the week.

Then we can come down to the day itself, where the morning circle begins the process of bringing the children into themselves, so they are at rest and comfortable in their body. Ready to learn. Any anxious or excess energy has been worked off, their faculties warmed and they are ready to learn. The Main Lesson follows, the real in point and then slowly we move the child out again into practice lessons. Practice lessons provide opportunity for practice - where skills learned in previous Main Lessons are practiced. As the day progresses we move to the doing lessons of the afternoon, like handwork and gym.

Then we come to the lesson itself, whether it be maths, art or languages. These will need to have their own point of in-breath and then the slow release out again. This holds for any lesson, albeit in different ways. Even an out-breathing activity, like handwork needs to first settle and ensure the children have 'arrived', then the mid-point of the lesson is deep sustained attention and then maybe a game or song at the end. A maths lesson will need the same shaping. Mostly teachers do it without thinking too much, as they actually breathe with the class and sense when the present activity needs to change or be loosened up.

Then there are specific activities which support the student to breathe out, an example of this would be particular types of singing or speech exercises which tend to bring children into themselves, for example alliterative stamping.

Steiner talks of every lesson needing to provide opportunity for an exercising of the child's soul life, including inward tension and holding one's breath with anticipation, story content with happy resolution punctuated with humour etc.

All this together provides for the child an experience of breathing - essentially through the guidance of the curriculum: *it is lived, not taught.*

He pito kõrero! "Ko wai Te Kāhui Whetū?"

Kia ora koutou e te whānau, I thought it would be good to share with the Taikura community some of the mahi (work) that has been going on between Waldorf schools around the motu (island). Te Kāhui Whetū are a collective of te reo Māori teachers, class teachers from Waldorf schools mai Te Ika-a-Māui ki Te Waka-a-Māui (from the North to the South Island), and Pippa, our principal representative.

The aspirations of this roopu are to ensure that te reo me ona tikanga are taught, practiced, and hopefully woven throughout our daily practice. We endeavour to do this to the best of our abilities for our tamariki and whānau, in Steiner/Waldorf schools in Aotearoa. This is no small feat, and one which we all carry with a great sense of responsibility. Te Kāhui Whetū meet regularly via Zoom and meet kanohi ki te kanohi annually, to discuss and share the different kaupapa Māori that we want to enliven, guide, and support the implementation of, in our schools.

Pippa is our principal representative from the Fellowship, which is a national body made up of Steiner/Waldorf principals across Aotearoa who come together under the umbrella of SEANZ - Steiner Education Aotearoa New Zealand. An integral goal of the Fellowship is to support teacher development and in the case of Te Kāhui Whetū it has enabled this motivated and committed group of teachers to come together in person at least once a year. These hui not only provide much needed support to those within this Kāhui but have also provided opportunities for targeted professional development to support staff at the kura (schools) who have hosted the hui. We hope that this reciprocal relationship with kura will be able to grow and develop with future hui around the country.

Our present project is a pōwhiri booklet. This rauemi (resource) is to help guide class teachers and schools with the pōwhiri process and the different forms it may take. Last Thursday, after the completion of this rauemi, a blessing and presentation was held with all those involved and the principals around the motu, via a Zoom conference! From there, the rauemi will be shared with all our kura Steiner, to help support their implementation of pōwhiri and mihi whakatau.

It is important that everyone in our school community understands that we are **bound** by the Covid -19 required vaccination order (No.3), and as an integrated school we must also abide by the advice from the Ministry of Education and its guidelines.

We will do our utmost to be respectful of different points of view, and to be aware of the impact of the order, but we are required to ensure compliance where there is a legislated mandate.

Whether we agree or disagree, like every other school in the country, we are bound by this order.

The Public Health amendment order will impact our community and create difficulty for some. Regardless of our personal views, this order will come into effect within two weeks and as a community, we need to navigate our way through the challenges. We need to ensure that the heart of Taikura can continue to provide the Special Character education and opportunities we all strive to achieve for our rangatahi.

In answer to a question being asked widely at present around group exceptions or medical exemptions for staff and also how this may affect our events, our understanding is that there will not be an option for group exemptions. There is currently little advice on individual medical exemptions but our understanding is that there are very specific criteria expected by both the Ministries of Education and Health.

This is an unsettling and challenging time for everyone, but let's not lose sight of why we come together around our school every day, and make sure that we keep the lines of communication open and the connections between us strong.

We welcome and encourage feedback and communication from our community on important issues. Being open to feedback and transparent with our community and staff in our decision-making is important.
