This week I have started the Parzival Main Lesson with Class 11. The story of *Parzival* by Wolfram von Eshenbach begins with the statement that a Man has both light and darkness within him. Inconstancy is described as darkness while steadfastness as drawing one closer to the light; but he who strives may reach blessedness. The theme of the book is Parzival's striving to transform from innocence to doubt to blessedness. He is said to be "a brave man slowly wise". It is a privilege to teach this Main Lesson and to be a part of discussions with our young people as they explore the questions and issues raised in this text and relate them to their own experiences and the world they live in today.

This week, as well as having the gift of the Parzival Main Lesson I have been moved by the generosity of spirit from staff, our governors as well as past staff and principals who have gifted time and kind offers of support to ensure that our students' learning is able to continue with as little disruption as possible.

As part of the vaccination mandate process staff had until midnight Monday to confirm their vaccination status, which meant that until Tuesday morning we did not have final confirmation for all. Moving forward those affected staff have until 1 January to be fully vaccinated, and some may return to working on site before the end of the year. Officially, staff currently not on site are on leave and every situation is different as per the individual nature of their position.

As with any situation when a staff member is on leave, cover is provided for their role and responsibilities, with the aim of providing as much continuity and consistency for our students as possible. Parents have been communicated with directly where their child's day to day experience has been impacted.

A couple of weeks ago, we showcased a Māori sculptural work, Māui-tikitiki-a-Taranga, that resides in the bottom floor of Taikura House. One of our parents, through personal connections with a tutor from Toihoukura, the Māori Visual Arts course in Turanganui-a-Kiwa (Gisborne), confirmed that the artist is Tai Kerekere and the school purchased the piece about 25 years ago. It was great to get the whakapapa of this taonga!

This week, with the support of Jen, our school gardener, Class 3 prepared the mara (garden) and planted the tipu (shoots from the kumara) in the gardens across from our kura. The rows were dug diagonally, facing east to west, to maximise the energy of Tamanuiterā (the sun) to support their growth. Ka mau te weh, i e te puna tuatoru...well done, Class 3!
