Te wahanga tuatoru (Part 3) - continuation of the Matariki story from last week...

Matariki is present for most of the year but disappears from the night sky in early winter. When the stars appear again in the middle of winter and the new moon has risen, it is the beginning of the Māori New Year. The old stories tell us that when the stars shine brightly, the year will be warm and good for kai, the weather will be kind, and there will be plenty of fish and berries to gather, and plants will grow tall and strong.

We can celebrate Matariki in many ways. It is a time for learning about our Atua, our tangible (the land, waterways, natural resources) and intangible tāonga (te reo me ōna tikanga, whakapapa, stories and history), and how to protect and practise these in our daily lives. It is a time for hearing stories of the old days and about how people used the stars in the past. It is a time to plant trees and winter crops, to fish and gather kaimoana. It is a time for creating, and a time to make plans for the coming year. It is a time to remember our loved ones passed, and spend time with whānau and friends.

The following was a suggestion, last year, of how you could celebrate Matariki, from Te Taurawhiri i te reo Māori – The Māori Language Commission:

To celebrate the Māori New Year, we invite you to organise a Matariki moment. Invite your whānau and friends to a shared kai, (or virtually share kai if you are not able to be together) then learn how to say the kaikōhau (expression of hope) below, to use at your kaitahi – meal together.

> Nau mai ngā hua Nau mai ngā pai Nau mai kia nui Kia hāwere ai

Welcome all things that have grown Welcome all things that are good May they be plentiful and abundant

School Board Update

Our school board met on 23 May, and items on the agenda included correspondence and the upcoming board elections. We received several items of correspondence from parents, however unfortunately these were not received in time to be tabled, having been emailed through on the day of the meeting. We welcome correspondence, but please be aware board agendas and supporting documentation must legally be received by board members at least two days before a meeting. Our practice at Taikura is to finalise our agenda and share papers with our board by the Wednesday of the week prior to the meeting, in order to give our board members plenty of time to consider and prepare. Board meeting dates are placed in the Grapevine, on our app and on the banner on our website well in advance. Dates for our meetings for the rest of the year are: 25 July, 12 September, 14 November (new board). Our meetings are public meetings and anyone is welcome to attend.

Board elections are due to be held this year. These would traditionally be held in May, but due to Covid they will be held in September. Further specific information, including the date of Taikura's school board election will be shared soon. What are school boards?

All of New Zealand's state and state-integrated schools have a school board which is the Crown entity responsible for the governance of the school. The board:

- ensures every student can reach their highest possible standard in student achievement
- is the employer of all staff in the school
- sets the school's strategic direction in consultation with parents, whānau, staff, students and the wider school community
- is responsible for overseeing the management of personnel, curriculum, property, finance and administration

Why join a school board?

School board members are active leaders in our schools. They have an important role of supporting strong professional leadership and ensuring effective teaching for all students through informed governance. Parents/caregivers and people in the wider community can be parent representatives. School boards need to represent the diversity of their school communities to ensure a bright future for all our children. The school board elections are the opportunity to vote for candidates who will make a positive difference for children's education. We need more people willing to use their skills and experiences for the benefit of students!

What sort of skills do board members need?

Every board member brings their own unique set of skills and experiences to the board. As a member of your school's board, you will need to work well in a team and have good communication skills. It can help to have an understanding of the education sector. You may have financial skills and experience in managing people, knowledge and understanding of particular communities within your school, or experience working within your school and wider communities.
