Open Letter From A School Board Representative

Kia ora e te whānau o Taikura

As a recently elected board member, I sat in the first 'proper' board meeting and I felt pretty privileged. It is not often that a parent is able to hear all the 'ins' and 'outs' of how a school is run (nor be responsible for how some of that works). You quickly begin to see a very full picture. The wins, joys, and aroha but also the challenges and struggles that make a school what it is.

My four tamariki have had (and continue to have) a pretty exceptional education. It's not perfect, nothing ever is, but it's 'whole' and it's heartfelt. Through the curriculum somehow they come out so grounded in who they are. I'm kinda in awe of my older two (21 and 22). I was never quite that certain of who I was at their age. Not saying that the journey is always easy for them, but you can pick a Steiner kid in a busy train station on the other side of the world.

I was also reminded of how much (like my own family) it costs to run a school, and ours even more so as we have so many Special Character elements that go on behind the scenes.

As I sat at the board meeting and listened to our principal tell a completely new board how stretched the budget was and how low the coffers were, I felt like bursting into tears. What a load to carry for the management team. I also wondered how many times I had thanked those people carrying that load and for all the mahi they carry out to make our school what is - with the children at the heart of it.

I remember something similar about seven years ago when things got a bit 'stretched' and some members from the Trust came and spoke at every parent meeting to raise awareness. I would like to do the same now.

With the knowledge that times are tough for everyone and all family budgets are so under pressure (as is my own), I'd like to ask that we all pledge those donations or as much as we are possibly able to. To get the school through this time but also to acknowledge the mahi that goes on behind the scenes to grow our children into the adults they will become. From observing the adults my older girls are now, I can tell you it's worth every penny!

Odyssey 2022



This year's Odyssey camp was filled with many first time events for me. I had never left from Waikawa Bay before, usually we kayak from Picton, however the wind gusting up to 20ks that day would have made the paddle from Picton extremely long. So by leaving from Waikawa Bay we were able to save two hours of paddling. Our route that day took us into Kumamoto Bay, which was our wet and windy resting place for the night, a beautiful spot with two fresh water springs and a beautiful view of the beach.

Our second day threw up many challenges with two kayaks needing some help navigating into Torea Bay with wind gusts of up to 70ks, sitting in a kayak paddling into those gusts truly showed what teamwork and will power meant. After a few changes in kayaks we continued to paddle 27ks into Mistletoe bay. We stayed here for two nights. We don't usually stay at Mistletoe Bay as it is quite flash, this is our base camp when the weather doesn't play by the rules and gives us some challenges. It's a wonderful campsite where fishing and stingray sightings were enjoyed.

On Thursday we walked 11ks to Anakiwa, the walk was an easy undulating track with beautiful views and lots of bush cover which sheltered us from the strong winds.

This year's class was able to navigate the strong gusty winds, the thunder and lightning and a wet rainy day, to successfully overcome mental boundaries and physical challenges. I really enjoyed the conversations we had along the way and reminiscing and listening to past stories was a real highlight for me.

I would really like to thank Aaron, Joe and Shaun for providing expert kayaking guidance and to Ray who supported the camp as well. To the students I really hope you continue to experience the outdoors and have many more adventures to add to your life's story.

Curriculum Corner

Oh no! It's all off to the dump!

Two weeks ago, working with the organization Para Kore which looks to educate and empower schools to “reduce waste through the delivery of innovative education and support within the frameworks of kaupapa and tikanga Māori”, Class 5 did a waste audit of rubbish bins in the Lower School. We found out that 90% of it could be recycled: Cans, paper, soft plastic, hard plastic, food waste, and food packaging had all made their way into the bins and all of it was going to go to landfill! On this one occasion, we managed to divert that 90% and put only 10% into the landfill, but it was evidently clear that Taikura can do A LOT better. As a result of this research, in the New Year, Class 5 will be spearheading a Green Team which will be educating the Lower School on how to organize their waste and addressing the big issue we have of how we process waste with our current bin system.
