




Harvest Table





He pito kōrero!

Nō hea tēnei ingoa...Te Mānukura?

Kia ora e te hapori o Taikura!

The naming of our whare was quite a task, as we met with Tū mai Taikura and then several meetings with 'pou whirinaki' (pillars of our kura, past teachers) who had seen the school from the initial seed that was planted in Heretaunga, and the journey along the way. The gathering of that whakapapa of our kura, was an interesting process. Their stories, woven together, giving rich insights of the evolution of Taikura.

At the planting of the mauri stone, Emilie Rutherford-Busck carried te kōhatu mauri onto the site, a single karoro (seagull), sent out a karanga as the dawn broke. As the kōhatu mauri was laid to rest in the ground where the new doorway of the Whare is, a group of karoro circled around the site. This was the initial tohu (sign).

Hui were also held with John Robin, who was the past Te Reo Māori teacher at Taikura and now one of the kaumātua of Kohupātiki Marae. When John saw the Whare for the first time, he talked about how the āhua of it reminded him of a huge manu, enfolding the space around it with their wide spread wings. When discussing the importance of ngā manu (birds), we talked about their migratory nature, with some that travel huge distances to reach their destination, like many of us who have travelled near and far to educate our tamariki at Taikura. We also talked about ngā manu being the messengers of the Atua, circumnavigating the realms of the heavens. We recognised the different types of manu and their varied attributes; from the kahu – the hawk as it soars through the skies, to the little pīwakawaka, flitting from space to space as it explores the ngahere, this felt like we were talking about our tamariki and the gifts they bring to our kura.

Lastly, the name of our school – Taikura, talks about the 'heartwood' of the tree, and when this kupu is separated – 'Tai' and 'kura' - Tai can be translated as currents (of influence, of emotion, of sensibility), as streams (of consciousness, of philosophy), as ocean tides, as tides of life and kura can be interpreted as a red glow, as a treasured possession, or as a sanctum of learning. It is also a sacred ochre, the pigment which comes from the blood that flowed in the separation of Rangi and Papa. We thought it would be good to have a common thread that linked the name of the Whare with our kura.

So, from all the above kōrero – Te Manukura was chosen as the name for the Whare. At the Opening ceremony of the Whare next week, when Papa Jerry Hapuku (Ngāti Kahungunu kaumatua) knocks on the walls of the Whare and asks the pātai "Ko wai te ingoa o te Whare nei?" (What is the name of this house) Our response will be "Ko Te Manukura, ko Te Manukura, ko Te Manukura!"

Tihei mauri ora! Nā, Matua Troy.

Arrivals And Departures

Each morning from 8:20 am a teacher will be at the school gate on Nelson Street to welcome each child to school with a “good morning” and a handshake. This is our Main School gate and the one through which all children and parents must enter each day. Children should also exit through the front gate. There is teacher supervision and a crossing patrol on duty until 3:10 pm. Buses depart promptly at this time. If you are picking your children up from school please make sure you are on time so that they are not left unsupervised.

Lateness And Absence Procedures

Please ensure your children are on time and have a proper start to their school day. Children arriving late create disruptions for the beginning of Main Lessons and Morning Circle. This is an important time of day where the verse is said and a positive mood established.

At the start of each day the Lower School (Classes 1-3 only) teachers send written notification to the office of the day’s absentees. High School teachers and all other classes enter absences or lateness directly into the student management system.

The office will text each parent/caregiver, via our student management system, if they have not already been notified of the absence. **Please notify the office of all absences, this includes holidays taken in term time, even if you have notified your child’s teacher.**

It is essential that parents/caregivers phone early (preferably before 8:30 am) and leave a message on the 24-hour answer phone (press “1” for this option). Alternatively, you can notify us through our SchoolApp.

If a Lower School child is late they must come to the office to report and get a signed note before going to class. High School students may go directly to class. All students leaving for any length of time during school hours, must sign out at the office every time they arrive or depart, eg. for an appointment.

For prolonged absences a medical certificate may be required. When a short absence is planned or known of in advance, please notify the **teacher beforehand as well as the office.**

In the High School a detention system for lateness is used to encourage students to develop punctuality.

School App

If you have not already done so, **we encourage you to download our School App into your smart phone.** You will find school contacts, newsletters, a link to our website, term dates, absentee notifications and our calendar which is filled with upcoming events, meetings, camps and trips. Subscribe to class alert groups and you will receive notifications such as class camp school arrival times and meeting reminders straight to your phone. So much useful information!

1. Go to the **App Store** or **Google Play Store** on your mobile device
2. Search **SchoolAppsNZ**
3. Download the **App**
4. Open the **App**
5. When it asks to send notifications – click allow.
6. When it asks to search your **School** – type your **School Name** in the search bar
7. Lastly, subscribe to the Alert Groups you would like to receive alerts for.


