In the text The Tasks and Content of the Steiner-Waldorf Curriculum edited by Kevin Avison and Martyn Rawson it states that rhythm is seen as a vital element in learning. "The school day and the school year are structured in an organic way, which establishes a healthy balance of experience between concentration and relaxation, mental and practical work, movement and rest, listening and participating, looking and doing." As teachers we strive to ensure that students experience a strong rhythm in their lessons, days and weeks within the kindergarten and school. "The celebration of the seasonal festivals gives the whole school year a balance and a sense of continuity as well as helping to form a strong community experience."

When reflecting on this first term, it has been incredibly challenging to maintain a rhythm. After three years of significant disruptions caused by national lockdowns many were looking forward to a much more settled year. Being able to again include whānau in our powhiri at the start of the year was a positive way to begin. Then our region was ravaged by a cyclone and the ripples from this event continue to impact many within our community in a multitude of ways. Since then our daily, weekly and termly rhythm has been further impacted by the need to rearrange learning programmes and reschedule events and activities within significantly reduced timeframes. Adding to this picture is the fact our teachers nationally are in the midst of negotiations for much needed improvements to their working conditions. These negotiations are being carried out by the teachers' respective unions and while we have experienced two days of industrial action in recent weeks we have been advised that there is considerably more planned for next term. Further industrial action is completely dependent on the outcomes of the negotiations and schools will not be advised until three days before each action goes ahead. Our weekly rhythm is normally based on a five day school week and in this ten week term we have only had three such weeks. All of these disruptions significantly impacted our ability to establish and maintain an effective rhythm this term. Our aim is always for a healthy balance and when this is hindered the impact is evident daily.

In amongst all the disruption however we have been heartened by celebrations, festivals and opportunities to come together. Post cyclone we had students, parents and staff who arrived on site with tools and wheelbarrows to tidy up before students returned. Many of us were also heartened by the generous donations of produce, time and effort which went into cooking and feeding our students, staff and families for the weeks following the cyclone. Within our kindergartens it has been wonderful to see families being included in harvest festivals and being able to meet together onsite for a coffee and a catch up. Last week welcoming our community to the opening of our beautiful new whare on a chilly autumn morning was a memorable occasion. Our teachers have been so pleased to see our students coming together for tabloid sports and play performances at the autumn festival, track and field events at our High School athletics day and sharing their learning and progress at assemblies, marae performances, fundraisers and Indian feasts. A heartfelt thank you to all who have contributed to ensuring the success of these wonderful aspects of our kura.

While many of our rhythms have been interrupted this term, adding stress and anxiety for many, these wonderful celebrations and festivals have provided substance and nourishment and for that we are truly grateful.

Wishing our staff and students restful holidays and all of our community a lovely Easter.

Once the blessing was complete, the inside and outside of the whare were bathed in light, and it was at that point that I felt te ihi me te wehi (the awe) of what we now have living in our kura!

There has been a flow of people who have wanted to visit the space and listen to some of the whakapapa of our whare. As people enter the whare, at the entrance sits 'Te kākano' our kōhatu mauri, that came from the Ngaruroro flowing through Kererū Station. I am reminded of the women who planted the seed for Waldorf education to be part of our landscape here in Heretaunga!

Easter Sunday the tree has eggs, symbols of new life and of resurrection

In some traditions/cultures - families will add an egg daily for forty days - the time Christ stayed on earth after the resurrection.




On Ascension Christ leaves the earth and returns to the heavens. The eggs are removed from the tree. Some families leave the tree bare in their home always, other traditions remove the tree until the next year.



In New Zealand if you use bare willow branches - these for the Southern hemisphere, create a wonderful picture of what is happening under our feet. The industrious work of the elementals, the in-breath of the earth, as she gathers her energies for the new year.

The young child observes this in the growing roots of the willow branch over the forty days of Easter. Nothing needs to be said - simply the growing roots in the vase on the dining room table may tell the story.


