Growing up I never really thought much about Anzac Day and what it meant. It wasn't until one day when collecting the mail, I read my father's full name on the front of a letter for him – Te Urunga Cassino Gardiner. My father's middle name is Cassino, which as a child I mistakenly thought was about a bet or a gambling incident? However, my siblings and I were told that he was named in honour of an uncle whose life was taken in Cassino, in southern Italy, during the Second World War. I then learnt that for many of our people, the names of the places where our tūpuna lost their lives during the different wars became the first or middle names of their descendants, so they forever live on in the hearts of their whānau.

Proprietors Trust Update

We would like to update our community on the status of the Class One building following the closure of the classroom post Cyclone Gabrielle. The Class One classroom was built in the 1970s and many past and present students will remember their first year at Taikura in this special space fondly. As part of the responsibility which the Trust carries for property, our Class One classroom was already due to be assessed, in particular in regards to ongoing issues with leaks. The cyclone brought this work forward. Following the damage caused by Cyclone Gabrielle, the Trust undertook a comprehensive review of the building, including an external report. Based on the information gathered it has become clear that the building's issues, including black mould and asbestos, would require a complete rebuild, something we do not believe to be a responsible use of our financial resources at this time. During our last meeting the Trust therefore unanimously made the difficult decision to decommission the building. Given the history of the building this decision was not made lightly, however the health and safety of our students is paramount. Currently the configuration of Classes one, two and three is working well, but is not a long-term solution going forward. Our next steps will be to work closely with management and staff to ensure our teaching spaces are fit for purpose, as well as future proof. This may include some possible remodelling of existing spaces. Further updates regarding spaces and the removal/demolition of Class One will follow, in the meantime if you have any questions or concerns, please do not hesitate to direct these via suzan.bart@taikura.school.nz.

Te Tāhuhu o Taikura - Focus for Week 1 and 2 Term 2 Our teaching focus this week will be Perseverance/Manawanui, specifically: Try your best at tasks given - Finish your Mahi.

The Chill In The Air Signals Winter Is On Its Way

During the change of seasons weather in Hawkes Bay can be unpredictable. Because of this, it is essential tamariki come to school with layers of clothes and wet weather attire.

The rain offers a completely different play environment from the more usual dry summer days. For children to get the most out of their play environment during winter it is important they bring to school layers of clothing, a good raincoat - reaching past the bottom and if possible some gum-boots.

Due to a child's accelerated metabolic rate they are not always able to fully regulate or recognise being cold, or when they are overheating, thus the importance of having layers available to them. Our curriculum is all about supporting the child to fully incarnate into their physical bodies. Warmth enables this incarnation process to happen more easily. With this in mind, during terms two and three it is helpful for students Classes 1 - 5 to keep a pair of slippers at school.



The layers your tamariki bring to school ensure we are able to support them to stay warm, or cool down.

Bookings after this date will not be accepted. Interviews are 20 minutes long.

We are very aware that your time is important. It is respectful practice to ensure our interviews run on schedule. To do this well teachers will be using a timer device. The alarm will sound at 15 minutes. This initial alarm will tell you there is 5 minutes to go and to bring the discussion to an end. A final alarm will sound at 20 minutes indicating the interview is over.

Interview times - start and finish as scheduled. If you are late, extra time is not added to the end of the interview slot. We are working to improve the punctuality of our meetings, and we thank you in advance for your support in this.

Smokefree And Vapefree Policy

Taikura is smokefree and vapefree, as required by the Smokefree Environments and Regulated Products Act 1990 (s.7A). We comply with the Act and have a smokefree and vapefree policy as part of our commitment to providing a physically and emotionally safe place for students, staff, and the school community (Health and Safety at Work Act 2015; Education and Training Act 2020). We aim to promote a smokefree and vapefree lifestyle to all members of the school community to help protect everyone from second-hand smoke and discourage students from taking up smoking and/or vaping.

Smokefree and vapefree requirements

Our school buildings and grounds (including school car parks and pick-up and drop-off areas) are smokefree and vapefree, 24 hours a day, seven days a week (with no exceptions). This applies to anyone on the school grounds, including students, staff, parents/caregivers, contractors, and people hiring or using the school facilities outside school hours. All school activities off school premises (e.g. EOTC) are also smokefree and vapefree (including transport between venues). This policy applies to all smoking and vaping products, including e-cigarettes.

We include the school road crossing (and rostered adults) in our smokefree and vapefree zone.

We take all reasonably practicable steps to ensure people know that the entire grounds are smokefree and vapefree at all times. To ensure our school is smokefree and vapefree, we:

- display the required signage (i.e smokefree and no vaping signs) at every entrance to the school grounds and the outer entrance of every building
- regularly communicate our policy to the school community (including staff, students, volunteers, and parents/caregivers)
- advise visitors, contractors, anyone working at our school, and anyone hiring or using the school facilities that our buildings and grounds are smokefree and vapefree
- educate students through the curriculum about the harmful effects of smoking, vaping, and exposure to second-hand smoke.

Breaches

Adults smoking or vaping in or around school grounds are reminded that the school is smokefree and vapefree by law and asked to stop or leave the premises.

If a student breaches this policy (either by smoking/vaping or supplying tobacco/vapes to other students), the principal (or their delegate) determines the appropriate actions to be followed. We may offer appropriate counselling and education, and contact parents/caregivers. The following policies may also be relevant:

- Behaviour Management
- Searches, Surrender, and Retention of Property
- Stand-down, Suspension, and Exclusion.
- Complaints

Complaints about breaches of this policy involving students and members of the school community may be made through the Raising Concerns process.

Complaints involving smoking or vaping in the workplace are referred to the principal, who may pass these to the board for investigation. Investigations follow legislative guidelines (Smokefree Environments and Regulated Products Act 1990, s.15). We refer complaints to a smokefree enforcement officer as appropriate.
