Secondary Schools Tournament Week 2023

Week 7 saw the Taikura 1st XI Hockey travel away to Levin for Secondary Schools tournament week. The team departed on Sunday from the school grounds and picked up the CHB players from Otane. Sunday night saw us with a training at 6:30 pm on the turf, while managers and Umpires attended their respective meetings.

Monday morning after an average night saw us playing Whitby College, from Wellington. The only other team with girls. Nerves were evident as this was the first game at tournament and the opposition were not going to give up in any way.

We scored first and they came back at us in the first quarter. We won in the end 6-1, Chris Deed scored 3 goals, Tyler 1, Kaito 1, and Emil 1.







Tuesday, we had a late game at 6:40 pm and the morning was spent in Palmerston North playing 10 pin bowling. We had to play Kuranui College, a Wairapapa team that had been in the final for the last two years at this tournament. This was a very hard game, and the opposition opened the scoring in the second quarter with two penalty corner goals. We dominated the game, and our field play was good, but we were not able to get the ball in the goal. Manu scored a goal in the fourth quarter, but they scored again, handing us a 3-1 loss. We were the only team to score against them in pool play, however. The Kuranui team acknowledged our teams ability and presented Chris with a beanie for his efforts, a really nice gesture.





Wednesday the team had another late game against Stratford High and even though we had lost the previous game spirits were high as we knew we should have won the game. The morning was spent at the NZ Rugby Museum. The game was a scrappy game where we did not play our best and the opposition knew that if they won, they would be playing in the top four just like us. Zak scored early in the first quarter from a penalty corner and Kaito in the second quarter with a field goal. We held and secured our place in the semifinals.







Thursday's semifinal was against Katikati College, a team from the Tauranga region who were tall strong boys. This was a rough game with our players being pushed around but our neighbours from the camp came and supported us and their support lifted our team. It was a must win to reach the final. We scored first with a penalty corner tap in from Tyler, Kaito then scored a field goal, but they came back on the half time hooter with a penalty stroke. Third quarter saw Zak score a field goal which secured the win 3-1. We had made it to the final and were guaranteed at least a silver medal. All players were nervous with the wait to see who we were to play in the final.







Friday was finals day with our game the last game of the tournament. We were playing the only team that we had lost to during the tournament, Kuranui College. The game started at a frantic pace. Kuranui scored in the first quarter with a field goal. We came back in the second quarter with a field goal from Chris Deed only for the opposition to score three minutes later, but not to be out done in the last minute of the first half Chris scored again from a penalty corner. The second half started at the same pace as the first half, very fast. Kuranui scored in the final quarter to go into the lead with only five minutes remaining. Taikura attacked and attacked and with only one minute left on the clock we were given a free hit on the top of Kuranui's circle. Kaito stepped up and seizing the opportunity quickly dribbled sidewards and made room for himself scoring with a tomahawk into the left side of the Kuranui goalkeeper. There was only 30 seconds left on the clock. This was such a high-level game with lots of awesome skills shown by both teams. However, with the game locked up and being a final an eight second shoot out was required to determine the winner of the tournament.

Kuranui had one final attempt to salvage the game and Ian Bailey dived to save the goal.

Taikura had won the Gold Medal match and the tournament.



As all whānau understand, and actively seek out for their tamariki, Taikura's Special Character means it is a very different school to any other. And the delivery of our Special Character costs. Our Lower School curriculum alone provides the opportunity for your children to engage with Te Reo Māori, handwork, woodwork, eurythmy, gym, drama, library, Spanish and the arts. For those students who have a need, we provide the Extra Lesson and the Listening Programmes. We facilitate therapies and music tuition. Our buildings and grounds are beautiful and well maintained. Your children receive a wonderfully rich and inclusive local Steiner education, which considers the whole child, and everyone at Taikura; management, teachers, support staff and governors, work hard and are dedicated to providing this.

Parents and whānau are the partners in their child's educational journey at Taikura, and one of their most important contributions is financial. As an example, our current inability to replace our gym teacher is a direct result of our financial situation.


