# Pippa's Pānui

At the end of last year, we shared with our community that the financial situation for Taikura in 2023 would be challenging, due to increased operational costs, reduced Special Character donations and a smaller roll. As communicated by our Proprietors Trust the real cost of our Special Character education is calculated to be \$5000 per year, per child. Up until now we have worked hard to cover the short fall between the Special Character donations which we receive and the actual costs of our education but given the increasing costs of today this is no longer possible.

At the end of last year, we made some difficult decisions regarding staffing as we were not in a position to replace our gym teacher or to have a journey teacher in Class One alongside our Specialist Class One teacher. Last term, two of our Lower School teachers resigned and due to our rising costs and the shortfall in Special Character donations we receive, we are looking internally for replacements for these positions. Thankfully we have a breadth of skill and knowledge within our teaching faculty, so our focus is on ensuring we find the best fit for both our students and our staff. We look forward to sharing these updates with the respective classes as decisions are confirmed in the next few weeks.

We have also had to consider our spending across all our staffing, not just teachers. As a result, we have been through a restructuring process within our administration team and our loyal receptionist Adrienne will be finishing halfway through this term. We will acknowledge and farewell her before she leaves.

The essentials of our Special Character live in the relationship of the teacher to each child and the work that they bring to the students through the curriculum. Within our Special Character the child is our priority. When Rudolf Steiner was establishing the first Steiner school his focus was on helping teachers develop their relationships with an understanding of the child before them; how to get a sense of what to bring to the children in the best way and at the appropriate time through the curriculum. At Taikura we value the breadth of the curriculum which presents the whole panorama of human development and allows for wide and varied ways for our students to meet success. In delivering this broad curriculum we are fortunate to have not just devoted class teachers but specialist teachers who teach across the school and enable our students to experience learning opportunities in a range of subject areas.

As the holders of our Special Character, our Proprietors Trust are extremely grateful to all those families that continue to financially contribute to the Special Character. We are well aware that many of these parents also contribute their time and commitment to the school. We are currently following up with parents who have not been contributing to our Special Character donations. In the coming weeks the proprietors will be communicating with all parents concerning the Special Character donations for 2024.

We find ourselves in a less than ideal situation, and we remain incredibly grateful to our dedicated staff who work extremely hard to deliver our broad and varied curriculum and the parents who have consciously made a commitment to this education and the gifts it provides for our students, as they journey through the school and kindergarten, an education that sustains them as they continue their course beyond Taikura.

## Curriculum Corner

Class 3 – Gardening And (House) Building

In Class 3 we are experiencing "the fall from paradise" and just like Adam and Eve we are working towards living with and on the earth and towards making it our home.

Through the year we followed the seasons and their qualities by establishing and caring for our garden. We pulled weeds, cultivated the soil, made it rich with compost, made holes and furrows, planted seeds and then watched the shoots come out of the earth and grow into plants.



All the while we continued to pull weeds, rake leaves, put up nets, created labels and made sure the plants had enough water.



Once the plants had grown, we were able to harvest and enjoyed carrots, radishes and spinach (still looking forward to our beans and lettuce and hopefully the sweetcorn will start growing soon). We enjoyed them raw as they were, in salad-, dip- or muffin form. We grew so much food that we have decided to donate some to the canteen so that others will also be able to benefit from our garden.



Next to growing food we were also busy with our (initial) building project of building a compost box. Not being able to take chainsaws into the forest we discovered pallets a good source for timber. We started to become familiar with different types of tools (claw hammer, crowbar, pincers, crosscut saws, clamps, squares ...) and set to work taking the pallets apart.





Honestly speaking, this work was harder than anticipated but we worked as a team, stuck with it and have now gathered enough timber to start building. We also decided to upgrade the initial plan and instead of a compost box we are aiming to build a little storage shed for next year's Class 3 to store their tools in ... watch this space.

Please note that all items sold at the event must be either handmade or locally sourced.


