The final term of the year has seen a number of changes to staffing at Taikura and we are very grateful to both our permanent and relieving staff for their ongoing flexibility and adaptability.

At the end of this year we will farewell Rewa Marks, Sarah Millington and Zahira Richard, all long term staff members in our High School who have contributed greatly during their time at Taikura. Rewa Marks and Sarah Millington have been class sponsors and teachers of sciences and humanities respectively and Zahira has been a valued teacher aide as well as taking care of our musical instruments.

We are very grateful to the staff who have stepped in during the second half of this year to provide consistency for our students. Lizzie Freeman at Taikura Kindergarten, Tanja Maioha in Class 2, Te Whiti Seeds in Class 6 and Jade Powell in Lower School handwork. We were also very fortunate to have Fiona Mackenzie taking great care of Class 5 for the last three terms and we look forward to welcoming her back permanently as our Class 4 teacher and Mr Hensel will be our Class 2 teacher.

As shared previously our financial situation has meant that we had to ask staff to redeploy and we are blessed to have Sandra Jordan, with support from Karyn Wills, stepping in to carry Class 7 next year. A significant loss as a result of this move is that Spanish will only be taught in Class 1 next year.

At the end of this year Leon Crellin will farewell his Class 7 and next year he will be picking up Class 6. Cherie Youngman has returned from her extended leave and she is looking forward to being the Class 3 teacher next year.

Over the years we have been very grateful for the stability and longevity of our Lower School classes. While this comes with gifts there is also benefit for students when they have teachers who are revisiting curriculum and developmental stages through completing shorter cycles. All decisions made in regards to staffing are done so with the student's needs at the centre. Where there are changes in class teachers we need to remember that for the most part the longevity of relationships remain due to the relationships within the class groups themselves and also with the specialist teachers who teach across the school, some from Class 1 to Class 12. These ongoing relationships provide consistency to the learning landscape. It is also important to remember that each teacher brings their own gifts to the curriculum and that is the strength of our special character.

With our receptionist finishing earlier this term our administration team have been very generous in picking up the various aspects which enable our kura to run smoothly on a daily basis and they have done this at a very busy time of the year.

In our High School there has also been a redistribution of roles and responsibilities for next year to ensure that all of our curriculum areas are covered. We are incredibly fortunate for the depth of knowledge and skill of all our teachers which allows for this flexibility.

## Parent Communication

Jess Scott shared her personal thoughts and understandings around donations and finances with Class One whānau earlier this year, and has kindly given us permission to reprint a shortened version of her email below. Mat Stott responded to the email he received, and has given permission to also share his response.

#### Aimee Hawke - Proprietors Trust

Dear whānau,

We all should have received an email regarding the school's financial situation and staffing. The school heavily relies on donations being paid and sadly the donation level isn't enough to carry on as it should. In simple terms, Taikura is a state-integrated school. This means we get some funding for our staff at state-level ratios. The attendance dues fee of \$1023.50 are set by the MOE which only covers the interest on our mortgages. Our donation of \$2000 in 2023 is to cover the special character of the school, beautiful grounds, extra classrooms that go over and above like music rooms, handwork rooms, extensive library, woodwork, extra lessons, listening program, and of course staffing. The staffing cost alone is \$350,000 pa over and above what the MOE fund. Taikura property is owned by the Proprietors Trust. The cost of ongoing maintenance of the property that the MOE does not pay for is in the region of \$300,000. Our school is amazing and our tamariki are so lucky to be there. The management, staff and the Trust are trying their very hardest and are putting the tamariki at the centre always. We are all well aware of the increasing cost of living for us all and that includes our school too. Prioritize this amazing education our kura has to offer. Please pay your donations and/or communicate with the finance team if this is not possible and make a plan.

I went to this school and my parents were teachers. We didn't have the luxury of space that is now available and the amazing buildings which were being constructed when I was at school. This property would be snapped up for residential development in a heartbeat and this place where so many people have been set up for life with a quality education would be gone forever.

The reality is that providing this quality of education comes with a price tag. I feel for those that are struggling but at the same time this school is struggling without the funds to survive.

Pay your fees or go elsewhere. The fees have never been hidden so it's no surprise!

The time for pussyfooting around this issue is over.
