#### **Reflections of Restorative Practice Workshop**

On Thursday 16 May at our Taikura Teacher Only Day we hosted a Restorative Practice workshop for all of our school and kindergarten teachers, our support staff and our governors. The facilitator for this workshop is from Te Whai Toi Tangata, University of Waikato and was made available to Taikura as part of our journey with PB4L (Positive Behaviour for Learning). The PB4L Restorative Practice Kete Book states that "Restorative Practice is based on a relational approach, which recognises that human beings exist in a world of relationships and that a person's character is developed through their relationships with others. The underlying principle of the relational approach is that all people are entitled to enjoy respect, care and dignity."

Over the course of the day staff worked through the following sections:

- Whanaungatanga -The importance of connection
- Restorative Practice What is it? Pedagogy, philosophy and application
- Restorative Conversations

"The fundamental hypothesis of restorative practices is disarmingly simple: That human beings are happier, more productive and more likely to make positive changes in their behaviour when those in positions of authority do things with them, rather than to them or for them". (Wachtel)

We appreciate the challenge for some families in accommodating students during these Teacher Only Days and we are very grateful for the opportunity it provides our staff to work collectively. We have had some wonderful feedback on this workshop from our staff including the following:

This workshop is the first step in our journey with Restorative Practice. From here we will work on a bespoke approach for Taikura which aligns with our Steiner Waldorf Special Character and enhancing the foundations we already have.

The above is a whakaara, that was a call by the sentries who looked out from the tūwatawata – a raised platform at the entrance of a Pā, informing people that an ope (group of people) were approaching or something was about to happen. I was asked by one of our ākonga "Matua, are you going to the Hui Taumata?" my response was 'Kāore a tinana, ēngari, kei kōna tōku wairua!" – Not in body, but definitely in spirit! The Hui Taumata is a call for Iwi – nations/clans to gather and to look at a united approach to the number of changes that have happened since the inauguration of the new Government.

Omāhu Marae is hosting this hui, and it is expected that thousands from around the motu will gather to discuss, debate and look at ways of addressing the issues that impact on all of us as a people. Taikura Rudolf Steiner School Hall on Thursday 6 June at 7:00pm





# The Essence of Steiner Education

Robin Bacchus will be the facilitator. Robin is an experienced Steiner/Waldorf teacher. He was one of the founding teachers of the Taikura High School and later taught a lower class for 8 years. At Taruna College he led the Steiner Teacher Preparatory Course for 17 years before traveling regularly to Asia as a Waldorf Education Consultant for 10 years.

The first evening will be on <u>Friday 7 June</u> from 7 to 9pm at the <u>Rudolf Steiner Centre</u>, 401 Whitehead Road, Hastings (over the road from Taikura School entrance).

Further evenings will be held on Fridays fortnightly: 21 June, 5, 19 July, 2, 16, 30 August.
