Last week at The Gisborne and Hawke's Bay Architecture Awards, Te Manukura was one of two educational spaces that was recognised and won an award in the Education category. 'Te Manukura is a take on a traditional wharenui, with kōwhaiwhai designed for the maihi by Charles Paringatai and waharoa designed by past students, under the guidance of master carver Nathan Foote. Designed by Atkinson Harwood Architecture, in conjunction with guidance of the school design group, the Rudolf Steiner school building skilfully intertwines Steiner philosophy with the essence of te ao Māori and is

described by the jury

as "a beacon of cultural enrichment".' It is great to note that both the architect Sol Atkinson and the structural engineer Nicholas Bednarek are past students of Taikura! Ngā mihi hoki ki Stead Construction and especially Sam Fuhrer, the site manager, who, along with our Property manager Liam Wyley, oversaw the construction of Te Manukura. He Pito Kõrero! Mānawatia a Matariki!

Ngā mihi o te tau hou Māori ki a koutou katoa - Greetings of the Māori New Year to you all!

I thought I would share a korero about one of the whetu that was always part of the nine whetu of Matariki. However, this whetu was not widely known, due to the misinformation about Matariki and because of the tapu (sacred) nature: Pohutukawa and Hiwa-i-te-rangi.

Pōhutukawa: is connected to the dead, in particular those who have passed on from the world since the last heliacal rising of Matariki in the month of Pipiri.

Māori belief determines that when an individual dies, their spirit leaves their body and undertakes a journey along Te Ara Wairua, the pathway of the spirits. This journey ends at the northernmost point of the North Island at a place called Te Rerenga Wairua (the departing place of the spirits). The dead travel along the rocky ledge towards the ocean where an ancient pōhutakawa tree stands. They then descend the aka (root) of this tree and disappear into the underworld. 'Below Te Aka, the long dry root of the pōhutukawa which does not quite reach the sea, is Maurianuku, the entrance to the underworld. Pōhutakawa is the whetū that connects Matariki to the deceased and it is the reason why people would cry out the names of the dead and weep when Matariki was seen rising in the early morning.

E tū Pōhutukawa Te Kawekawe I ngā mate o te tau Ruiruia ngā mate ki te uma o Ranginui Anā! Kua wheturangihia koutou. Behold Pōhutukawa Who carries the dead of the year Scatter their spirits into the cosmos You have now become star

Mānawatia a Matariki, nā Matua Troy.

Kua whetūrangitia koe....

The above whakataukī (proverb) in this context means, "Return, take your place amongst the stars along with your ancestors that adorn the sky". As part of our activities at Taikura to acknowledge and celebrate Matariki, we are having an early morning gathering, making whetū - stars, in remembrance of those who have passed on and placing these on the tree outside the library. This will happen in our library, followed by breakfast of porridge and frybread and a hot drink in Te Manukura. This will be held on **Thursday 27 June, at 6.30 a.m.** There will be a cost of \$5 per person, to cover the cost of kai and materials. In Aotearoa a Community of Learning, Kāhui Ako, is a group of education and training providers that form around their students' education pathway, working together to help students achieve their full potential. At Taikura we belong to a Kāhui Ako which consists of Steiner Waldorf Schools throughout Aotearoa.

Three teachers within Taikura hold positions which respond to the work undertaken by the Kāhui Ako. Vonda Christensen is the within school leader (WSL) for the development of formative assessment within Taikura. I myself have an equivalent position for the review of our school curriculum. The purpose of within school leaders is to promote best teaching practice and strengthen the use of an inquiry approach to teaching and learning.

Sandra Jordan holds the across school leader role for formative assessment. Across school leader roles allow teachers to share their skills and knowledge in new ways across the Kāhui Ako. With this teachers can learn with and from their colleagues in cycles of inquiry and improvement.





Winter Festival


7.30pm Saturday, 29th June 2024 Rudolf Steiner Centre Hastings
