The cold, wet, dark days of winter have been drawing in over the last few weeks, keeping us inside over wet lunchtimes, off wet fields, wearing our gumboots, raincoats and woolly hats. But the weather has not slowed the pace of learning activities this term at Taikura.

It has been a term full of events and activities and there was a strong sense of urgency throughout. Early in the term parent-teacher interviews were held for both the Lower School and High School, an opportunity to review progress made in the first term and to set goals for the rest of the year. In addition to parent-teacher interviews, numerous meetings have been held this term across school and kindergarten with parents and students discussing academic progress, updating IEPs and IBPs, addressing behaviour concerns and looking at opportunities for additional support. We have been fortunate to have Dr. Helen Proctor working with us and this term has seen her attend kindergarten meetings, meet with students and whānau and participate in a child study.

For our students winter sports are now underway. Class 12 had a week off timetable, working on their Class 12 project topic and over the last four weeks they have been working on their play, with the final performance taking place this evening. Class 11 had their week of work experience, working off site in a setting of their choice. Several of the students were offered employment at the end of the week which is just one of the positive outcomes of this learning experience. Class 11 have also enjoyed a number of offsite visits in recent weeks, to see a dramatic performance, a day at the rocky shore as part of the Ecology Main Lesson and a walk to the supermarket in preparation for their cooking challenge. Class 10 had the opportunity to hear first hand the issues of the civil rights movement. Class 9 began the term with their mountain biking camp and in the middle of the term Class 8 performed their play to both the school and community with very positive reviews. A highlight of last week was the costume parade for all of our students as part of Te Wiki o Te Pūrākau.

Our students across our kindergartens and school have experienced Whitsun, Mid-Winter and Matariki celebrations and festivals this term. Many thanks to the parents who richly supported our school Whitsun festival with the beautiful set up of spaces and those who attended the parent spiral walk at mid-winter.

Our teachers have had a full term with many involved in additional professional learning opportunities outside the classroom including a movement course at Taruna, zoom hui nationally with fellow Steiner Waldorf school and kindergarten teachers, multiple hui focused on both our local and our national Steiner Waldorf curriculum development and our collective workshop on Restorative Practice. Our Lower School teachers have held reciprocal visits with Otane school, and our High School staff hosted an information evening for students and parents of Class 6 and 7. This term our kindergarten staff and parents have continued their weekly Simplicity Parenting study group.

I hope that over the holiday break our students and staff can rest and restore themselves and embrace the experience of the winter months. For some that may include cosy inside activities beside a fireplace or bracing themselves against the elements in the snowy mountains or enjoying the winter quiet in their gardens, local park or bushland. I look forward to welcoming you back next term as the rhythm of our year continues its journey.

Curriculum Corner - Class 11 Ecology

Recently Class 11 completed an Ecology Main Lesson with the focus being on investigating the presence and importance of a community pattern. Examples of community patterns in ecology are; stratification, like that seen in the vertical layers of vegetation in forests and jungles, succession, which is seen in barren areas by the replacement of pioneer species by others over time, and zonation. Zonation is what Class 11 went to investigate on a beautiful sunny day in Ahuriri to see

if organisms lived in differing horizontal bands at low tide.

Transect lines (strings) were wound out from the shore and





students placed quadrats (square frames of wood) every 2 metres to count the numbers of each species in a square. From this they would later create kite diagrams to examine the distribution of marine life and the interconnectedness of the living world.

After all the counting was complete the students explored the rockpools further, finding many sea stars, crabs, sea anemones, and sea snails but sadly no octopus was found lurking

under the rocks. This was followed by a tour of the Aquarium, an incident with the travelator, curly fries for some, and time on the beach.

A big thank you to the National Aquarium for their support and knowledge they provide our local kura.






Friday Market reminders and helpful tips:
