# Cybersafety Evening

We want our school and our community to be a safe place for all children. Our tamariki are growing up in rapidly changing times, and the risk, frequency and severity of online harm are increasing. We need to tackle this as a community. As such, we have organised filmmaker, author and speaker Rob Cope, producer of the documentary "Our Kids Online" to come and give what promises to be a humorous and eye-opening evening talk to our parent community.

#### His talk will cover:

- Cyberbullying How bullies can reach our children 24/7
- Social media How social media is affecting the mental health in 3 out of 5 children. FOMO, depression, anxiety
- Gaming and the developing brain An oversupply of dopamine leading to dopamine deficiency, synaptic pruning, and the underdevelopment of social skills and empathy
- Naked Selfies The pressure to send nudes from intermediate up through high school
- Online predators The methods they use, how to spot them
- Online porn vs healthy sexuality How consuming online pornography as a child or teen can create a sexual template where violence, aggression, and dominance are seen as normal and consent can become very blurry.

#### Solutions

- Filters Which filters are best and how to install them
- Smartphones How to lock down a smartphone to make it a safe phone
- Boundaries How to put good boundaries in place around device use
- 3 golden rules The 3 golden rules that will keep your children safe
- Talking to your children How to have difficult conversations with your children
- Challenging our own phone and device usage Reconnecting as a family.

The talk will be held at the Taikura School Hall on Tuesday 5 November at 6:30pm. Please note this talk is for adults only and is not suitable for children or teens to attend.

We request that at least one representative from each family attend, and hope you are able to prioritise this within your busy lives. This topic is too big for us not to pay attention.

During our break, the Aotearoa Songbook was released, and this is some of the background about this awesome rauemi -resource!

A digital book featuring some of New Zealand's most iconic waiata Māori have been revamped and recorded as a resource for schools.

A group of reo and haka exponents partnered with APRA MCOS NZ to create the 'Aotearoa Songbook'. It will be used by schools that want to reconnect with some of Aotearoa's most iconic classical music.

Hana Mereraiha, the lead project manager on the book, said it's a project that's been in development "for a long time with the idea of creating a resource for children that brings together some of the most famous songs of all time from composers who have passed on."

The online book contains 22 songs, each including the correct lyrics, melodies and context surrounding its origins and composer.



#### THE SCHOOL DRESS CODE

It is part of the Special Character of Taikura Rudolf Steiner School that we do not have a uniform for students. Whilst the staff acknowledge that some students tend to be influenced by the latest fashion trends and to experiment with their appearance, what they wear and how they wear it is important. All our students are important role models for those younger than themselves and our students represent Taikura in the wider community, so we expect all clothing to be of an appropriate and functional style for school activities. There are public occasions such as the Carol Evening and off-site visits where smart casual dress is required.

#### **Clothes**

- Clothes must be presentable and appropriate for a public environment. Frayed edged garments, ripped garments or holes from wear and tear are not acceptable.
- Cleavage, and sides must be covered, and undergarments should not be visible in those areas or through sheer clothing. Strapless tops, bare midriff clothes and low-cut tops and dresses are not to be worn. Tops must be worn at all times.
- In our Lower School slogans and branded clothing must be acceptably discreet no bigger than the area of a standard playing card size on any part of clothing.
- Images contrary to the law or the school philosophy, Eg marijuana leaf, references to alcohol, sex, drugs, skulls or violent images, movie or video game images, insulting words or phrases on clothing are not acceptable.
- Images and logos honoring Te Ao Māori and Te Reo Māori are acceptable.
- Shorts, skirts and dresses must maintain decency when moving around the school, upstairs and in classrooms and underwear must not be visible.
- Lower School swim and beachwear should be modest and functional. A rash vest is recommended for sun protection. Swimming togs should be a one piece or a two piece that covers midriff no bikinis.

#### Hats & Hair

- Hats and caps must not be worn inside, and hoods must be kept down at school.
- Brimmed sun hats are compulsory outside for Lower School students in Terms One and Four
- Hair should be kept clean and off the face and clear of the eyes.
- If boys have facial hair, it should be neat and well groomed.
- In the Lower School dyed or coloured hair, extreme styles such as mohawks, dreadlocks, shaved heads, number ones, shaved pictures such as lightning bolts, checker boards, are not allowed.

#### Lower School - Jewellery / Makeup

- No rings, bracelets or jewellery allowed unless approval has been sought for cultural reasons
- A concealed taonga/necklace may be worn
- Discreet studs or small sleepers may be worn in ears that are pierced
- Other piercings are not permitted
- Nail polish, makeup or lipstick are not to be worn
- Tattoos (other than cultural), stick-on tattoos, facial glitter, face paints are not permitted
- No aerosol sprays to be used on school site due to allergies.

#### High School - Jewellery / Makeup

- Discreet piercing is acceptable.
- No aerosol sprays to be used on school site due to allergies.

#### Footwear

- Shoes/sandals must be worn at all times except in the gym.
- No slippers, rubber/plastic jandals, ugg boots, steel cap boots or stilettos are to be worn.

#### Physical Education/Gym Lessons

Students from Class 3 upwards are required to bring a change of suitable clothing for Gym lessons. A change should include: a T shirt, shorts, track pants or sports leggings, a sweatshirt (if cold).

- All jewellery and watches removed
- Long hair tied up
- Optional a pair of shoes suitable for field or turf play (if outdoors)

#### **Woodwork & Handwork Lessons**

- Closed shoes
- Long hair tied up
- No dangling jewellery /clothes

The school reserves the right to direct students to change their attire if we deem it necessary. In the Lower School this may also include the removal of nail polish, make up and/or jewellery.

It is important that we have a clear direction on the standard which is required to fully reflect both a pride in ourselves and in our school. Emphasis will be on the condition of the clothes, overall presentation, modesty and suitability for our working and learning environment.




