Waste management on Fête day

We are continuing to try and reduce the Fête's waste footprint each year, and we need your help.

We will have two waste stations: in the food area on the main field and where the old Class 1 building was. Bins will be clearly marked and there will be a Waste Station Warrior working at the waste stations all day. All other bins will be covered up on the day.

We will be diverting all waste into the different waste streams:

- Paper and cardboard clean
- Compost/food scraps to the pigs
- Recycling plastic/tin/glass
- Paper coffee cups will be cleaned and used for seedlings for Fête 2025
- Soft plastics
- Landfill last option. Let's see if we can have less than we did in 2023!

If you are working at a food stall please try to put all your waste in the correct bins to help save the extra work of sorting them after the Fête.

We will have two water stations (at the waste stations) with some paper cups for emergencies, but we would love you to bring water bottles to help reduce the amount of cups used. A reminder to bring a reusable cup for coffee, and even a plate and cutlery if you can. Thank you for helping us protect Te Taiao!




He Pito Kōrero!

Ngā mihi mahana mai ngā hīhī o Tamanuiterā e te whānau! Greetings to you all, as we feel the warmth of Tamanuiterā returning to Hineraumati!

Last week on 28 October, it was exactly 189 years since the signing of He Whakaputanga o te Rangatiratanga o Nu Tireni (known in English as the Declaration of Independence of the United Tribes of New Zealand) occurred in Aotearoa. He Whakaputanga was signed by 34 northern rangatira, and a year later, when the first flag to represent our country was recognised by the King of England, other rangatira signed it, one being Te Hāpuku, a rangatira from this rohe and a tupuna of Papa Jerry Hapuku, the kaumatua who oversaw the blessing of our whare, Te Manukura.

He Whakaputanga has been seen as the pre-condition to Te Tiriti o Waitangi. It consisted of four articles – it asserted that sovereign power and authority in the land resided with Te Whakaminenga, the Confederation of United Tribes, and that no foreigners could make laws. Te Whakaminenga was to meet at Waitangi each autumn to frame laws, and in return for their protection of British subjects in their territory, they sought King William's protection against threats to their mana. They also thanked the King for acknowledging their flag.
