He Pito Kõrero

He maimai aroha

E ngā mana, e ngā reo, e ngā mātāwaka o te whānau whānui o Taikura Nau mai, haere mai, nau mai hoki mai ki tō tatou kura, mō tēnei wāhanga tuatahi o te tau nei!

A warm welcome back to you all for the beginning of our new year. I hope that your holidays have been a time of rejuvenation, reconnection and rest, for all!

During our summer break, I was in Tāmaki-maka-rau – Auckland, when I heard about the passing of Patrick Parsons. Pat Parsons was a local Pākehā kaumatua living at Poraiti, who had over many years, through relationship and research, became one of the entrusted repositories of Kahungunu whakapapa (the iwi of this area).

Years ago, through the kumara vine, I had heard about Pat and his abilities to recount local history. I rang him, as I wanted to talk with him about local history, especially Ōtātara Pā; the significance of this place, and the iwi and hapū (subtribes) who first populated this rohe. He agreed to meet and walk around Ōtātara Pā, sharing stories and history. My dictaphone in hand, I captured his kōrero, and then transcribing it for my own personal reference. His sharpness of mind was incredible. As we walked that whenua, Pat referenced the different names of tūpuna (ancestors), the general dates of events, the whakapapa links and evolving histories that have formed what we know today. Pat was also interested in my own Kahungunu whakapapa and was able to relay invaluable kōrero about my whānau.

The korero that he shared about Otātara Pā is the same korero that I share with our ākonga, as we walk that Pā site. 'Portraits, Places and People'

You are invited! An exhibition by Art Teacher Clayton Gibson and students from Taikura Rudolf Steiner School.

As a High School art, history of art, history of architecture, mythology and drama teacher at Taikura Rudolf Steiner School, I am pulled in all directions planning and teaching the subjects that I am passionate about.

As preparation for the lessons and the units of work that I teach, I use my visual art practice to help me process the content, and trial some of the art assignments that I am asking my students to attempt. By doing so I am able to gain a deeper insight into the themes I am exploring with my students and I

am able to work through the pitfalls that they may experience while creating their own work.

Due to the breadth of subject areas that I am asked to prepare for, and my way of preparing through my art practice, this particular exhibition is quite eclectic in nature.

I have attempted to break the work into three distinct themes. The first theme explores events that have occurred in Aotearoa history that may have not been part of my own education.

The second theme explores portraiture of family members. Even though I don't see myself as a portrait artist, I ask my year 13 students to explore this very subject matter, so it would be unfair to ask them to explore this area of art without attempting it myself.

The third part of the exhibition explores art techniques that I am asking my Year 10 and 11 students to explore. This part of the exhibition explores places that I have been or feel connected to. I have used this subject matter in conjunction with composition derived from the exploration of cubism as part of our studies in History of Art.

Accompanying each section of the exhibition are examples of student's work from our school, showing what these very talented students can create using similar techniques and subject matter.

EOTC Update

Kia ora whānau,

As we step into a fresh year of Education Outside the Classroom, I want to share some important updates about how we'll be managing consent for the activities and communication.

We are moving to a new system on KAMAR (our student management system), which will allow us to send emails directly to families. These emails will include links to consent forms. Once you open the link, you'll need to tick the required sections and add any necessary comments. Please note—if you close the link before completing the form, it will no longer work, and you'll need to request a new one. Please be patient with us teachers as we navigate this new system. For example you might get communications twice or three times depending if a teacher is trying to send out information to one or two parents (sorry class 8 parents!).

We will be getting all information from KAMAR so please update your email addresses, phone numbers, and health details so we can get a hold of you and if your child needs medical attention we have all the details to make informed decisions.

For those keen to volunteer as camp helpers, please check in with Suzan at the office to confirm the status of your police vetting. All parent helpers must be police vetted—this is essential for ensuring the safety and well-being of our tamariki, a police vet needs to be renewed every 3 years.

A gentle reminder to read all camp and day outing information carefully. Setting your child (and the teacher in charge) up for success starts with making sure they have everything on the gear list. A well-prepared student is a comfortable and capable one!

Communication is key. If you have any questions or need clarification, please go directly to the teacher in charge of the activity. This helps to prevent miscommunication and ensures you're getting the most accurate information.

It's shaping up to be a busy first term, with Class 8, 12, and 6 all heading out on week long excursions. We're looking forward to a rich and rewarding time in nature together.

I also want to say a huge shout out to all the volunteers who help us out on these day trips and overnight camps, we literally cannot do this without your support.

If you also have any skills, or ideas about amazing local places that we could utilise as a school please speak to your class teacher or myself. We would love to hear your ideas.
