Last term we updated our Communication Procedure and due to the working together between home and school at Taikura there are aspects of this procedure that we would like to share with whānau.



The Grapevine, our school and kindergarten pānui, is our primary vehicle for sharing the life and culture of our kura. The Grapevine is published every Thursday on our website and our school app, and a link is emailed directly to all school families.

Our Website, SchoolApp, Facebook page and Instagram account are additional platforms which are used for sharing the life and culture of Taikura School and Kindergartens. Regular updates, announcements, reminders and alerts are shared via our SchoolApp and this is the platform which will be used to communicate during an emergency.

Emails and Text Messages: Taikura does not expect staff to read or respond to text messages or emails outside of work hours, however, it is expected that staff will respond to all emails received from parents and whānau within two working days. We recommend that text messages and emails are used for information sharing only. If a conversation is needed we encourage arranging a face-to-face meeting. Termly pānui will be shared via email with parents from the Kindergarten, Lower School Class Teachers and High School Sponsor Teachers.

KAMAR is our student management system where all up-to-date contact information for students and their whānau is stored. Parents and whānau are reminded termly of how to access the KAMAR portal via which they can check their child's details, attendance and academic results. Please notify office@taikura.school.nz of any updates to your details, including emergency contacts. All EOTC consent forms are now completed digitally via KAMAR and links to these documents will be shared with parents via email.





Information regarding **Parent Hui Evenings, Liaison Parent Meetings, High School Information Evenings** and any other hui or community events is communicated via our usual platforms (Grapevine, email, SchoolApp). Kindergarten Teachers, Class Teachers and Sponsor Teachers hold at least three whānau hui (parent evenings/afternoons) each year. Traditionally these are held in the evening, but afternoons have also worked in our kindergartens and for combined Lower School events. Whānau hui may be for individual classes or kindergarten groups, or for a combination of classes or kindergarten groups.

Ko wai a Tū mai Taikura – Who is Tū mai Taikura?

The pātai above is asked from time to time by people who are wondering what or who this roopu is. Below is a brief description of who Tū mai Taikura are.

Tū Mai Taikura is the whānau Māori (parents/caregivers of Māori students) at Taikura who meet (when possible) every term to discuss and look at ways of moving forward with aspects of te ao Māori (a Māori world view lens). These hui support and enhance the implementation of these matters/topics for the betterment of all at our kura. It is also a space for whānau Māori to discuss, guide, or share concerns and look at how to address these matters from a Māori perspective.

The name Tū Mai Taikura was coined from these hui, and the name means to stand for Taikura within a Māori framework. There are several kaupapa that this group have helped guide over the years:

- Understanding, acknowledging and celebrating Matariki
- Māori signage specific to our school character
- Understanding of karakia (verses), waiata, and language
- Supporting teachers in their understanding of te reo me ona tikanga Maori language and protocols
- Celebrating Te Wiki O Te Reo Māori
- School powhiri
- Mihi whakatau

This is not a closed group, it is very fluid in terms of those that attend our hui. However, the core purpose is to meet and discuss matters pertaining to Tū mai Taikura, and create whanaungatanga for whānau Māori at Taikura.

Tētehi whakataukī o Matariki

Hauhake tū, ka tō Matariki The harvest ends when Matariki sets

In the month of Haratua (around May), you can see the Matariki star cluster set with the sun in the west. When this happens, it's a sign that the season for harvesting food has come to an end. This whakataukī is used before winter begins to remind people to prepare themselves for the cold months ahead.

He pito kōrero is a space dedicated to celebrating and promoting Te Reo me ōna Tikanga Māori



School Board Update

Taikura School Policies

Self-harm

Self-harm can also be referred to as self-injury or non-suicidal self-injury (NSSI). Self-harm is when someone directly and deliberately causes physical harm or injury to themselves, usually without suicidal intent. Students may self-harm for different reasons, including as a coping strategy to manage difficult emotions and/or life events (e.g. anxiety, distress, bereavement, grief). Self-harming behaviour can range in severity from minor to severe and can start at any age. As self-harm can cause mental and physical health issues and is a risk factor for suicide, Taikura Rudolf Steiner School has clear procedures in place for intervention and response.

Our school follows the procedures outlined in our policy to ensure students who self-harm are supported. All staff are made aware of these procedures as part of their staff orientation and/or regular child protection training. If required, we may activate our crisis management plan to guide our response.

Peers or friends may also notice or have concerns that someone is self-harming. They are encouraged to inform a teacher or staff member so that the school can follow the appropriate procedures and arrange support for the affected student.

We work with the student, parents/caregivers, and relevant health professionals, as appropriate, to set up and maintain support at school and outside of school. A support or safety plan may be developed and staff may monitor the behaviour and wellbeing of the student.

In line with our whole-school approach to wellbeing, we encourage parents/caregivers to inform the school if they are concerned that their child may be self-harming. This helps the school take appropriate actions to ensure the student is safe while at school. Parents/Caregivers may work closely with relevant staff to support the student as necessary.

We recognise that a self-harm incident can impact other students, particularly if the incident took place at school. We take appropriate actions to support affected students who may experience a range of emotions after the incident.

Staff and other members of our school community affected by incidents of self-harm are encouraged to seek support through health professionals and support services. Staff may seek support through senior management and an Employee Assistance Programme (EAP) if available.

Alcohol, Drugs, and Other Harmful Substances

Taikura Rudolf Steiner School maintains a learning environment free of alcohol, drugs, and other harmful substances to provide a physically and emotionally safe place for students, staff, and the school community (Health and Safety at Work Act 2015; Education and Training Act 2020). We comply with all relevant New Zealand legislation and take a whole-school wellbeing approach to alcohol, drugs, and other harmful substances.

If a student or staff member is potentially impaired by alcohol, drugs, or other harmful substances while at school, work, or attending a school-related event, the school has an obligation to manage the risk to ensure the safety of everyone.

Staff are made aware of this policy as part of their staff induction and as required. This policy also applies to anyone supervising students in any activity organised by, or on behalf of, the school (e.g. EOTC events).
