# It's Fete Day on Sunday!

#### **Administration Centre**

When you arrive on Sunday to set up your FOOD STALL, please check in at the Administration Centre in the Gym Foyer. From here you can collect your float, provisions, and other essential information.

The following services are available at the administration centre:

- Information and administrative support
- Sustainable supplies including cups, plates, napkins, utensils etc.
- EFTPOS with cash out
- Money exchange and collection facilities
- First Aid services
- Safety equipment
- Lost children hub
- Magic Bean sales

### **Health & Safety**

Please note

- No smoking, e-cigarettes, vaping, drugs or alcohol anywhere on the school grounds
- No animals allowed on site

Use gloves and be conscious of hand washing, particularly when serving food. Those preparing and serving food must not also handle money.

### **Setting Up**

<u>Please ensure your stall is set up completely by 9:00am on Sunday 16 November.</u> You may access the grounds from noon on Saturday 15 November to set up. The grounds will be patrolled by HSM security guards overnight. Please arrange to set up without young children in tow – this will be an active site and we would like to ensure everyone's safety and comfort.

### **Vehicle Access**

Vehicle access to and from the site is from King Street, next to Taikura House. If you take a vehicle onto the site, the maximum speed inside the grounds is 5km/h. Please be mindful of all people and activities! On Sunday, the site must be clear of vehicles by 9:00 am. There will be no vehicular access to the grounds before 3:15 pm, when the big field has been cleared of children.

#### **Parking**

Community and external stall holders should park on King Street. Please DO NOT park on Nelson Street or Whitehead Road near school so that there will be spaces for guests attending the Fête.

### **Financial Arrangements**

Food stalls will be provided with a cash float on arrival. Periodically, one of the administration staff will collect surplus cash. At the end of the Fête please bring your float and takings to the Administration Centre.

Children's activities will operate on a STRICTLY MAGIC BEAN basis. If someone would like to pay in cash, please direct them to the nearest Magic Bean Sales point – at the Main Gate, the Administration Centre, and by the pizza oven at the entrance to Scannell's garden. Should the bean vessel become full before the conclusion of the Fête, they may be emptied at the Administration Centre. At the end of the Fête, please bring bean vessels to the Administration Centre at 3:00 pm, and no later than 4:00 pm.

#### **Stall Dismantling**

Dismantling of stall sites may take place after 3:00 pm, with all materials removed by 6:00 pm on Sunday 16 November. Items remaining on site after this time will be removed and disposed of. Please ensure the grounds are returned to their original condition after the Fête.

### **Magic Beans**

All Children's Activities at the Fête will require two or more Magic Beans. Magic beans are available to purchase using cash or Eftpos at a special rate for Taikura whānau ahead of the Fête. Last days today & tomorrow! Taikura whānau pricing:

- \$10 for 12 beans
- \$20 for 25 beans
- \$30 for 38 beans

### **Plants**

For those raising plants for the plant stall – please bring them to school on Saturday 15 November between 8:00 and 10:00am so they can be sorted and priced.

### Waste management on Fête day

We are continuing to try and reduce the Fête's waste footprint each year, and we need your help. Bins will be clearly marked and there will be a Waste Station Warrior working at the waste stations all day. All other bins will be covered up on the day.


We will be diverting all waste into the different waste streams:


- Paper and cardboard clean
- Compost/food scraps to the pigs
- Recycling plastic/tin/glass
- Paper coffee cups will be cleaned and used for seedlings for Fête 2026
- Soft plastics
- Landfill last option. Let's see if we can have less than we did in 2024!

If you are working at a food stall please try to put all your waste in the correct bins to help save the extra work of sorting them after the Fête.

### Transitions and Teacher Cycles at Taikura

Our community may be aware that we are looking to employ a new kindergarten teacher as well as two Lower School class teachers for 2026. These positions have been advertised, and we are currently interviewing candidates. Going through this process gives us an opportunity to reflect on the transitions from Kindergarten to School and Lower School class teacher cycles at Taikura.

Over the years Steiner Waldorf schools around Aotearoa have explored different models in regards to the transition of the children from kindergarten to class one, the length of time that teachers are with a class in the Lower School and if High School sponsor teachers stay with their class or move through the High School. Historically it was very common for a class teacher to undertake an eight-year journey with a class, back when Class 8 were the top of our Lower School, from Class 1 to Class 8.

In 2017 our school and kindergarten staff dedicated significant time to reviewing transitions and teacher cycles at Taikura. We involved parents, students and staff who had experienced first hand both 7 or 8 year journeys and those who had experienced shorter cycles throughout the Lower School. The transition from kindergarten formed part of this review and led to the establishment of a Specialist Class One teacher position which Sue Hull currently holds. This review also considered class teacher cycles. The various positives and challenges were explored in regards to the development of the children, relationships, teacher knowledge and confidence, social dynamics and the need to value curriculum delivery and experiences for our children.

There was a sharing of examples of when a 7 year journey can be wonderful but also when it can cause long lasting issues. There was the acknowledgment that there are times during the Lower School journey where having a new class teacher can support the children's development by enabling them to be seen through a new lens. There was an acknowledgement that relationships within classes and between parents, teachers and children, can be our greatest strength and our greatest challenge. There was also an acknowledgement that challenges are important for development, both for our students and for ourselves as teachers but ensuring it is the right kind of challenge is important. There was also an acknowledgement that despite our best efforts and intentions, sometimes life has other plans and unexpected staffing changes happen.

The outcome of this review highlighted the importance of flexibility in teaching roles as a response to student needs. Decisions about whether a Class Teacher continues with a class should be guided by what best supports the learners. Each year brings new dynamics, and it's essential to reflect annually on what the students require and how we can meet those needs effectively. Ensuring that the teacher in front of the class is fresh, responsive, and well-suited to the group is key to fostering student growth. Challenges play a vital role in learning—for both students and teachers—as they encourage development and engagement. This approach is not about judgment, but about prioritising what is best for the children. The school must support these decisions to ensure that students experience stability through having teachers who are aligned with their evolving needs.

These pictures of the class teacher cycles and its development over the years are shared as part of our Special Character interviews with new parents and were shared with the community at the time. Continuing to reflect on how best to meet and support the needs and development of our children remains a priority for our Taikura teaching staff and how best to support transitions and Lower School teaching cycles continue to be discussed and improved annually.

We are hopeful that our upcoming interviews of prospective new kindergarten and Lower School teachers will go well and that we will be able to share updates on our new appointments before the end of this term.


