Ahurei o Ngāti Kahungunu — Kahungunu Kapa Haka Festival!

Reflections on our kapa at the festival

Walking through Te Kura Kaupapa Māori o Te Wānanga Whare Tapere o Takitimu, I am overwhelmed by the expressions of culture from the tamariki, rangatahi, the kaiako, ngā kui me ngā koroua, all smiling and happy with the day that will present itself with various kura displaying their kapa haka prowess.

I see familiar faces sitting and waiting in anticipation of "Te Manukura", the Taikura Rudolf Steiner School Class 6 and 7 kapa haka.

The MC steps forward mic in hand and announces that "Te Manukura" is about to step onto the stage and perform for the first time. They look calm, they walk with pride and humility and then they begin...

My account of the performance will be different to all others who watched and vice versa, my account holds back tears of joy at what unfolds on that stage. I am overwhelmed at the achievements of these rangatahi and those

that have held them in this light. Overwhelmed that from all walks of life they have bonded, they have persisted, they have demonstrated commitment, and they have stood in unity to express Māori culture to the very best of their abilities.

special on so many levels, from the clear pronunciation of te reo, the soulful sound of their waiata, the harmonies sounded by their collective voices filling the hall, to their own achievement of standing on a stage performing kapa haka to those blessed to be there.

I am reminded that culture shared and culture expressed creates meaningful shifts in consciousness towards understanding. The level of performance of Te Manukura on this day stirs my imagination to believe that they are the leaders of tomorrow. To that end, we must acknowledge and give loud applause to the leaders of the present that have helped Te Manukura to stand tall on that platform. That through it all, we have people in our community that give of themselves above and beyond, that we have ākonga accepting the challenge, and that we can be overwhelmed by the beauty expressed by our rangatahi when they come together.

Our kapa haka tamariki and rangatahi made my heart swell yesterday representing Taikura at the Kahungunu Primary and Intermediate Schools Kapa Haka Festival. There was a bubbly positive vibe filling the bus with chatter as well as the odd nervous comment of, "Oh whaea, I really don't want to do this anymore!"

As we pulled into the gates of Te Kura

Kaupapa Māori o Te Wānanga Whare Tapere o Takitimu, the whispered awe of, "oh wow, is this a school?" when they saw the carvings, the buildings and te iwi Ngāti Kahungunu. They conducted themselves beautifully walking through the kura.

They took their place on stage. I was at the back with Matua Troy so I couldn't see their faces but I could feel the ihi and the wehi within every one of them. They were standing together supporting each other so well. Every one of our tamariki should feel extremely proud of themselves, they sang their waiata and did their haka beautifully. Poututerangi spoke with such mana and dignity. His mates right there at his back. Our roopu burst into their first waiata, singing clear and strong, they carried this all the way through until we exited the stage. Halo carried the kaea kōhine role with such humbleness and strength, Carter led our tama through to the front with his clear melodic voice, Timo started the haka with such kaha, and Juan took on the haka with power and humility.

It was a wonderful thing to see and hear our kapa haka roopu perform at Te Wānanga Whare Tapere o Takitimu today as part of Te Ahurei o Ngāti Kahungunu. They really did us proud! Poutūterangi opened the set with a beautiful and strong mihi; as kaitātaki (leader) he opened the way for our rangatahi to deliver a tight set of waiata-a-ringa, haka and hīmene. As the other kaitātaki, Halo's clear voice rang out as she led the roopu in the 'Ruawharo' and 'Waiatitia' waiata; this was one of my highlights for sure. All the performers contributed to the collective heartbeat of the takahia, held their form, held their mana, carried their gestures, and sang so beautifully. There were some lovely harmonies coming through, too. Another of my highlights was hearing Carter sing 'mata rawa e' to lead the roopu into 'Tika tonu' - wow, what a voice he has!

Taikura Rudolf Steiner School: Commitment to Te Tiriti o Waitangi

The Board and Proprietors of Taikura Rudolf Steiner School reaffirm our unwavering commitment to Te Tiriti o Waitangi.

Upholding Te Tiriti is not a symbolic gesture—it is embedded in our daily practice, in the values our ākonga aspire to: Whakaute, Atawhai, Manawanui (Respect, Kindness, Perseverance). It is reflected in our Annual Strategic Plan submitted to the Ministry of Education, and in the Memorandum of Understanding between the Proprietors and the School Board. These frameworks guide us in meeting our obligations under Te Tiriti.

We acknowledge the recent changes to the Education and Training Act, which remove the statutory requirement for school boards to "give effect" to Te Tiriti. While the Government has clarified that boards must still seek equitable outcomes for Māori learners and reflect cultural diversity, we believe Te Tiriti is foundational to education in Aotearoa. It is not an optional extra—it is a constitutional document that shapes who we are as a nation and as a kura.

In response to the Minister's comments, we appreciate the emphasis on achievement and equity. At Taikura, we see these goals as inseparable from honouring Te Tiriti. Steiner education teaches us to consider all perspectives, fostering empathy, ethical reasoning, and social responsibility. Our students learn that partnership and justice are essential to community wellbeing.

Our position is clear:

- We will continue to uphold Te Tiriti o Waitangi.
- We will continue to recognise mana whenua and nurture relationships with local iwi and hapū.
- We will continue to embed te reo Māori and tikanga through our He Reo Ora strategy.
- We will continue to ensure our curriculum reflects te ao Māori alongside the NZ Curriculum.

This stance aligns with our peak body, Steiner Education Aotearoa New Zealand (SEANZ), whose Equity Statement affirms Te Tiriti as the constitutional foundation of our society and commits Steiner schools to honouring its principles.

As we look ahead, we draw strength from the whakataukī:

"He toka tū moana, he ākinga nā ngā tai"

(A rock standing in the sea, lashed by the tides) — a reminder of resilience and steadfastness in times of change.


Advent Season

This Sunday - 30 November marks the first Advent Sunday.

Advent starts on the fourth Sunday prior to Christmas. It is a time of inner searching, introspection and anticipation.

It is through the darkness of the Earth that we await the birth of a new inner light to warm our hearts and strengthen our thoughts and deeds. This is manifested in the Christ Child of Light born on the night of Christmas. All the kingdoms of nature – Mineral, Plant, Animal and Human – await the coming birth. Advent is an inward journey of the soul, when we become aware of the eternal light that illuminates our way. It is beautifully entwined in the northern hemisphere with the Winter Solstice and the return of the Sun, and in the southern hemisphere with Summer and celebrating the continued warmth of the Sun. Advent is a fun-filled and joyous time, especially for children. A time that will be etched in their memories forever.





Advent in the Waldorf home is something that is celebrated by families of every religious background, every faith, and every spiritual path as part of the festival cycle of the year. The following traditional Advent verse can be used in the lighting of the Advent candles:

The first light of Advent is the light of stones -Light that lives in crystals, seashells and bones. The second light of Advent is the light of plants -Plants that reach up to the sun and in the breezes dance.

The third light of Advent is the light of beasts - All await the birth, from the greatest and the least. The fourth light of Advent is the light of humankind - The light of hope that we may learn to love and understand.

Many Waldorf schools and families celebrate Advent by looking each week at the natural kingdoms on Earth: minerals in the first week, plants the second week, animals the third week and humans in the fourth week, all awaiting the birth of the Christ child.

We invite you to keep your eye on our school Advent table which sits in our hall foyer just outside the hall entrance - this table slowly builds up its tableau during the weeks leading up to Christmas - the day marking the birth of the Christ child.


