Lower School students need to please arrive at 5:45pm and go directly to their classrooms. We kindly ask that you do not arrive earlier than this time.



The Shepherd's Play - A Christmas Tradition

One of the most beautiful and meaningful celebrations of the Christmas festival is the study, practice and performance of one or more of the Oberufer Plays.

In medieval times three plays were performed on Oberufer, an island in the Austrian Danube. Characters were played by members of the community who kept the same roles from year to year. Karl Julius Schroer published

this play along with others in 1858. Sometime later, his student, Rudolf Steiner, edited the plays and set the language in the regional dialect, retaining much folk humour and liveliness. Around 1940, A.C. Harwood translated the plays into English, a challenge, given the obscure language, which is of course nothing like a true dialect. But it was a good solution to a difficult problem, and has become much beloved over the years. Steiner worked with an Anthroposophical musician named Leopold van der Pals for the music we use today.

The Shepherd's Play is one of these three plays that have been passed down to us. The Paradise Play, acting as a preface, presents the expulsion of Adam and Eve from Paradise, but with the promise of future salvation through Christ. The Shepherds Play portrays the birth of Jesus in a stable, where he is sought out by a group of shepherds. The Kings Play depicts the visit of three wise kings to the birth-place of the King of Humanity, as well as the murderous attempts by Herod to thwart Jesus' mission.



Community Performance this Sunday 14 December at 7:00pm in the hall

At Taikura all three plays have been performed, but it is the the Shepherds Play that has survived the test of time. It has been performed by teachers for over 60 years. In the fourth term, volunteers are called for from the teaching staff, and rehearsals (sometimes less than a handful) take place, the teachers relying on collective memory and words learned in previous years, or in some cases learned by osmosis from watching the play as children. The result is that the play is not always perfect, but always enjoyable.

Despite the lack of time, the importance of the play in our school calendar is not underestimated. The play is a gift for our children and to our school community and for many it sets the mood for the Christmas festival.

Fete Donation to Taikura

The Fete committee are delighted to announce that after everything has been tidied up and all of the bills have been paid, the donation amount to the school is **\$30,000!!** We once again thank the school and parent community for coming together, everyone that volunteered, signed up early, the amazing logistics over the weekend and the wonderful support from Kindergarten and Playgroup whānau.



The money raised is gifted unconditionally to the school by the Fete Committee on behalf of all the parents. This allows the school to choose the projects that most needs support, and which directly benefit students. You will notice many projects around the school which the fete has funded over the years such as the hockey turf, shade sails, Lower School and High School playgrounds. There have also been less visible donations which support our students, for example to the H3 fund. This year we have also invested some funds into fete resources by purchasing waffle makers and a popcorn machine, which will be available for use by classes for fundraising throughout the year.

Property Update from the Proprietors Trust - A Unified Kindergarten Site

Our kindergartens—Taikura and Kererū—currently operate from two separate locations, each with its own licensing agreement. Following discussions in 2021, we have been working towards greater cohesion, fluidity, and connection to our kindergarten and nursery group offerings by bringing both kindergartens onto one site.

This arrangement would enhance opportunities for staff collaboration, resource sharing, and continuity for children. It would also ensure long-term sustainability and future-proof our early childhood education offerings.

We approached the idea of one-site by looking into expanding provision on each of our existing sites, and by looking at purchasing adjoining properties, each of these options proved unfeasible. Fortunately, adjacent to our Kererū Kindergarten site is the school's less-used hardcourt area. A plan has been developed to expand the kindergartens into this space; this would allow us to develop a purpose-built facility that would house all our kindergarten and our nursery group provision on one site. It would also enhance health and safety by removing the need for parents to cross the road between school and Taikura kindergarten.

What that means for the hardcourt recreation provision and the existing Taikura Kindergarten site has not yet been decided.



The proposed new kindergarten building would serve as the main entrance for both Kererū and Taikura Kindergartens, accessed via the Taikura House carpark. The centralised entry point offers several benefits: it moves access away from a busy road, provides designated parking for parents, and creates a unified hub for all families. In addition to dedicated nursery and kindergarten rooms, the new building would include staff offices, a parent space, and a library. All tamariki would enter through a shared foyer, where sign-in/sign-out will occur and notices will be displayed. From there, children would transition into their respective spaces. Taikura tamariki would access their rooms via a deck to the left of the building, while Kererū tamariki will follow a landscaped path to their existing space. Access to our kura would remain via the main school entrance on Nelson Street North.



Bringing both kindergartens together on one site has many benefits. Our kindergarten teachers are supportive of this proposal and have been included in the conversation since its inception. This project will be developed independently of kindergarten fees.

School Policy - External and Private Tutors

Taikura Rudolf Steiner School may allow external or private tutors to work within our school environment to support students and extend their learning. The board is responsible for overseeing and managing any external and private tutors who work at our school.

In keeping with our primary duty of care and related health, safety, and welfare obligations, we ensure the safety of students and other workers. As visitors to our school, external or private tutors have a responsibility to take reasonable care for their own and others' health and safety when using school facilities. They must sign in and sign out at the school office each time they are on site.

Tutoring requests

We may allow students to be released from class to attend approved tutoring sessions. Requests for students to receive external or private tutoring on or off site should be directed to the principal in the first instance.

Requests from external or private tutors to provide services at Taikura Rudolf Steiner School should be sent to the principal in writing.

In processing such requests, we consider:

- individual student needs
- health and safety requirements, especially any police vetting and safety checking requirements
- how tutoring will impact our school curriculum and timetable
- any resources, facilities, or additional staff supervision that would be required.

Tutor requirements

Any external or private tutors working on site at Taikura Rudolf Steiner School must meet the relevant safety checking and police vetting requirements for children's workers as required by the Children's Act. We safety check external and private tutors that are engaged or employed by the school. If tutors are engaged directly by parents and the school allows the tutor to meet with students on school property, the school confirms with the parent the tutor has been safety checked, and may also safety check them as good practice.

We assess tutors for suitability as necessary, including qualifications, experience, and personal accreditations/memberships. Tutors are expected to follow our community conduct expectations. All tutoring arrangements are reviewed annually (or earlier, if circumstances change), following consultation with parents/guardians of the student.

The school seeks written consent from parents/guardians before any tutoring takes place. Parents/Guardians or caregivers are responsible for the costs of all external or private tutoring.
